Our West Coast Fever team did an incredible job of representing

our State in 2020. Especially after spending 3 months in the Queensland Hub and going all the way to the Grand Final. It may only be our second in history however, it is our second in three years, which is no mean feat. We remain positive a Premiership is just around the corner.

Although falling heartbreakingly short of victory, as I am sure we can all remember, we could not be more proud of the Team and all they did. It is appropriate to acknowledge the incredible sacrifice our Fever players, coaches and support staff made to compete in 2020. We should also congratulate our athletes Verity Charles, Jess Antiss and Courtney Bruce in their selection to the National Squad. Also we should be so proud that Stacey Marinkovich has been selected as the Australian Diamonds Coach.

That said we need to acknowledge that as an organisation we fell significantly short of your expectations in regards to the WCF compliance breaches. For that we have much to do in order to regain your trust and confidence – and we are committed to doing so. Much has been done already in this regard but we acknowledge there is more to do.

Our NAIDOC Carnival and Association Championships achieved near record participation.

Shooting Stars, our Aboriginal educational program encouraging young girls to stay in school in WA's remote communities, has been another beacon of strength in 2020, providing a constant source of support for the communities in which it operates.

Now operating in eight sites across the State, Shooting Stars is working to address significant gaps in gender in remote Aboriginal communities, where we know young girls are 40% less likely to finish school.

Fran Haintz and her team have continued to set the benchmark in this space and we look forward to what will be a big year for the program in 2021.

I'd like to take this opportunity to acknowledge our partners who have continued to support our great sport through the toughest of times- thank you. We could not have achieved the success we have had this year without your support and we look forward to working with you all again next year.

To our members, Clubs, supporters, and fans, you have been a foundation of strength for our sport in its most challenging year, and we thank you for everything you have given and continue to give.

We could not be prouder of what you've all achieved in 2020.

On your behalf I would like to extend to the Board members of Netball WA, West Coast Fever and Glass Jar and the fantastic staff of these organisations thanks for your dedication, commitment and professionalism - in this the most extraordinary of years. In particular, I would like to extend a huge thank you to Jill Powell and Emma Chinnery who both retire from the Board of NWA at this years AGM having completed their maximum terms. They have given so much to Netball WA over the last six years that we can never really thank them enough – their legacy however will live on. Importantly, they are not lost to us as Jill is now a director of WCF and Emma remains on the Board of Glass Jar

Yes we have had our challenges in 2020 and we have faced them head on. To be honest we could not have risen to these challenges and achieved the things we have without the confidence that comes from knowing we have such a dedicated, passionate group of people, such as you, behind us. # **STRATEGIC PILLARS**

To achieve our 2018 – 2022 ambition, our Strategic Plan is built around four key strategic pillars:

- 1. People & Culture
- 2. Participation
- 3. Pathway
- 4. Business Performance

Defined within each are the goals and strategies that will drive a series of outcomes for the respective pillars, facilitating our ability to be sustainable and grow. The ability to focus our energies on these pillars will enable our organisation to further strengthen the pathway that sees our athletes journey from Suncorp NetSetGO through to West Coast Fever and national representation. It will allow us to invest the time and resources into delivery that our ever growing game now demands. Our strategies will set the course for a period of commercialisation that will ultimately support these pillars for the next two years.

While a volume of work has been required to set these critical paths, we must also promote an environment of flexibility and responsiveness that will enable our business to react appropriately to a constantly evolving world and market.

Central to this organisational agility and performance will be our ability to leverage the knowledge and expertise of our workforce, not only within our administration but amongst our broader netball community. We believe that every one of our Members and stakeholders has something valuable to contribute to one or more of these pillars. Consequently, the process of consultation across all facets of our sport that was so important to shaping this plan will continue over the next five years to ensure that it always reflects the needs of our community.



# STRATEGIC PILLAR 1: PEOPLE & CULTURE

#### Goal 1: Leadership, Management and Workforce Effective, accountable workforce that achieves outcomes through collaboration

Despite the challenges of 2020, the focus on our values, leadership, management, and staff remained a core focus throughout the year, particularly in relation to health and wellbeing. Indeed, this was even more so as the impact of COVID-19 peaked across certain months of the year, resulting in significant pressure across all aspects of the sport, our team, and our communities.

Delivery of our planned Professional Development program in 2020 was significantly impacted by the COVID-19 restrictions. Online programs continued and expanded as a result, including MS Office based programs and a range of webinars being offered to the management and leadership team relating to managing and leading remotely during this period. Certain mandatory (compliance based) learning occurred across the year, including OHS based First Aid and Fire Warden certification. Opportunities for professional development were also undertaken at AIM, with the support of the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC).

The implementation of an expanded Human Resources Information System in 2020 (ELMO) has resulted in a range of benefits, including increased access to on-line learning, improvements in operational efficiencies and effectiveness, reducing the degree to which related processes were reliant on manual input and double handling across departments and resulting in a more fluid, professional, and automated process across Recruitment, Induction, Performance Management and Learning & Development.

# Goal 2: Performance, Development and Accountability

Outside of COVID-19 and managing the substantial workload associated with it, the implementation of our ELMO HRIS (HR Information System) platform has remained a primary focus n 2020.

ELMO recruitment is now live. Job ads go directly to SEEK and Netball WA/Glass Jar/West Coast Fever Websites after requisition approval from the General Manager of the allocated department, General Manager of People and Culture and the CEO. Ads will update instantly, and candidates apply directly to the ELMO careers portal. Candidates will now be located in ELMO, with candidates that appear to be a good organisational fit being able to be added to a dedicated talent pool.

ELMO on-boarding is also now active, following testing of the system with current employees being used for feedback on ways to improve the system for our future on-boarding staff.

ELMO learning has been utilised for COVID related learning and a range of other modules with further learning in development phase.

The People and Culture team have utilised the services of our graphic designer to design the homepage for current employees and the on-boarding page for candidates joining the organisation. The on-boarding dashboard includes the NWA staff structure, our purpose, vision, values, and the onboarding users' team, with a landing page specifically branded as per the relevant entity (NWA, GJA or WCF).

#### Goal 3: Culture, Engagement and Recognition

Throughout 2020, our core values, behaviours and organisational culture have been tested like never before. As individuals and as an organisation we have come through this most challenging time stronger, digging deep to show amazing resolve and commitment particularly across the middle of the year when we experienced the biggest impact of the pandemic, resulting in all staff having to suffer reduction in hours, salary and with majority of our staff being stood down. We have never faced anything like this before and the organisation was incredibly proud of the way the team navigated their way through this most unwanted of experiences.

Outcomes from our Workplace Satisfaction and Culture Surveys continue to show incremental, positive progress and our staff retention continues its upwards trend.

Overall, through the most difficult of times, the team has shown terrific resilience over the course of 2020 and we are all looking forward to 2021 with great optimism and enthusiasm.

The Culture Surveys were undertaken across NWA, WCF & Glass Jar. Outcomes conducted this year showed that the level of employee satisfaction sits at the following:

Netball WA – 78%

West Coast Fever – 81%

Shooting Stars – 89%

This represents an increase in outcomes from the previous surveys conducted at the end of 2019. These results, given the trying circumstances under which we have been operating over the past few months, are encouraging and reinforce our strong performance in this area.

In July we held a workshop with the Management and Executive team aimed at identifying further improvement initiatives based upon the outcomes from the Culture Survey, resulting in a number of recommendations for development and implementation across the remainder of 2020. This focus on continuous improvement and engagement is one of the key factors that support our ongoing growth in outcomes.

Since the stand up of staff at the end of June, the Social Committee has been active in developing a range of events and activities to support staff engagement. In July we held a Christmas in July event and in August supported the Community Regional team with a trip to Holey Moley during their visit to the GNC as part of their annual planning & training week as well as a Melbourne Cup event and Staff Christmas function.

Following an absence due to COVID-19 our monthly Employee Recognition Award recommenced in July. This award is peer nomination driven, with nominations based upon a common set of values and behaviours (Professionalism, Collaboration & Innovation) & the recipient being determined by the Executive team. This is a popular initiative amongst the staff, with over 30 different individuals being nominated for the award across September & October.

#### Award and Recognition Program

There were five (5) Award and Recognition meetings held in 2020.

The key achievements by the Committee in 2020 included:

- The completion and implementation of the Netball WA Service to Sport Award Policy and the awarding of the inaugural three recipients in Vicki Chadwick (Narrogin & Districts NA), Don Leyland (Royals Netball Club & Perth Netball Association) and Tanya O'Connor (Bunbury NA). This award recognises the significant, sustained, and lasting contribution and quality of work or service consistently initiated. performed, or undertaken for netball in WA by a member over a minimum of thirty years. Between all three volunteers. there are over 150 years of service and contribution to our sport and their local communities. The recipients were presented with their awards at the 2020 Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships Opening Ceremony and were acknowledged at the 2020 NETBall, both held at RAC Arena.
- The completion and implementation of the Court of Champions Award Policy. The Court of Champions celebrates West Australian developed players who have reached the ultimate pinnacle in the sport by representing Australia at the highest International level of competition available at the time, and who have made a significant contribution to the sport in Western Australia. The first inductees will be presented with their award in 2021.
- Netball WA made a significant contribution to two galleries within the newly opened WA Museum -Boola Bardip, these being the Ngalang Koort Boodja Wirn - Our Heart, Country, Spirit and Reflections
   Our People, Our Stories. All three Netball in WA Organisations - Netball WA, West Coast Fever and Shooting Stars are represented in these exhibitions, which highlighted our rich history, our people and their communities, our programs, and competitions and those who continue to make our game as great as it is.
- Even with a COVID interrupted year, some progress was made on the Netball WA History & Heritage Framework outlining the proposed key activities in the lead up to and during our Centenary year

in 2024. Netball WA used the services of a local historian to undertake this process. In 2020:

- » Our History & Heritage Working Group made the Gold Netball Centre their base, where for the first time, all major memorabilia are housed within the home of Netball WA.
- » Netball WA undertook oral histories of five past Association office bearers. These recordings will be made available to the public in due course.
- We surveyed our Past Players & Officials to ascertain what their current engagement with the sport was and to see how they would like to continue or re-engage with our community.
- » The development of comprehensive biographies of all Life Members commenced.
- The Awards & Recognition Committee said goodbye to Marita Somerford and Michelle Cattalini and welcomed Tash Aristei (Netball WA Board Member) and Helen Riolo (Arividis), a past Perth Orioles and State Open Team player.





#### Goal 4: Social Integrity and Footprint

Netball WA completed its first Innovate Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) including the reporting required by Reconciliation Australia. There were many achievements across the two-year life span of our RAP. A sample of these highlights include:

- Netball WA staff, including the new initiation and maintenance of a RAP Working Group;
- Integration of RAP agenda items, including Welcome to Country or Acknowledgement of Country into Board, Executive, Annual General Meetings, Presidents, Regional Advisory Committee and Staff Meetings;
- Organisation of National Reconciliation Week (NRW) activities for all staff including the participation in external NRW activities across both years of the RAP;
- Increased cultural learning and education opportunities for our community and completion of the RAP Measurement Impact Survey from years 2018-2020;
- Participation in NAIDOC Week activations both internally and externally across all years;
- Undertaking an Indigenous Round with supporting activations during the Gold Industry Group WA Netball League. Encouraged our local Associations to do likewise with many starting to rollout their own activations. Most notably, in 2020 Belmont Netball Association conducted an Indigenous Round for their entire Association which included a Welcome to Country, guest speakers and cultural dancers;
- Held NAIDOC Netball Carnivals with specific activations in Perth, Broome, and Geraldton, with participation in these events growing year on year;
- Continuation of flying the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags everyday outside the Gold Netball Centre each day and having visual displays of the Acknowledgement of Country Plague, artwork, and photo imagery within the Gold Netball Centre;
- Dissemination and education of the netball cultural protocol document to our stakeholders and community;
- Engagement with key stakeholders, to continue to build our relationships and understanding of

reconciliation;

- Procurement of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders suppliers and providers in our business activities;
- Continued investigation of opportunities to improve and increase Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander employment outcomes within our workplace;
- Joint research between Shooting Stars and Netball WA to identify the barriers to participation and pathway opportunities within our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community. This project is known as the 'Black Diamonds' project.
- Became a member of Reconciliation WA.

The Netball WA RAP has had a significant impact on our organisation, the staff, and our broader community. As a community-based organisation, engagement and relationships with our people is key to our business, and through our Innovate RAP, we have focused on ensuring our relationships at all levels have been meaningful, purposeful, inclusive, and most importantly, respectful. These relationships have been built on a greater understanding of the history and stories of our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who have so willingly shared their stories, provided support and direction, and encouraged each of us to undertake our own learning and be part of the reconciliation journey. We have learnt so much and there is so much more to learn. By committing to our RAP, we have continued to provide access to netball, grow participation in our sport, be a leader in the sports industry and advance the communities across our state. By committing to our RAP, we have developed key organisational values of Professionalism, Collaboration, and Innovation as well as several of our key behaviours, ensuring that the reconciliation journey remains a key focus for us all.

Netball WA has commenced work on the development of our next RAP and are currently engaging with RAP mentors at Reconciliation WA & Reconciliation Australia to support us in this process and to ensure that we undertake the necessary steps to bring our Boards, RAP Working Group, staff, and community along this very important journey.





# STRATEGIC PILLAR 2: PARTICIPATION

#### Goal 5: Retention and Conversion Driving the netball economy to its potential

#### Membership

A strong membership strategy was developed late in 2019 for 2020 with the Marketing and Community Department Stakeholder team responsible for the input and implementation. The onset of COVID-19 saw a change to our focus from March-June to include an engagement campaign through the Netball at Home videos. The re-engagement campaign included "It's Time to Play" with a return to netball focus after the COVID-19 lockdown.

Membership numbers were strong early in the year prior to our social media campaign and the COVID-19 lockdowns and restrictions. During the lockdown, all staff worked incredibly hard ensuring the Associations were in a position to restart their competitions when restrictions lifted.

Once restrictions were lifted, the It's Time to Play campaign began with a focus on returning to netball and a how-to guide. Once again we engaged Marketforce for our spring campaign which saw us implement the Grow Your Game tagline focusing on using spring to grow players' social circles, skill sets or love of the game.

All the campaigns over the year along with the commitment by Netball WA staff and Associations have allowed us to maintain 85% of our original membership player Key Performance Indicator (KPI).

#### Regional Office Structure & Footprint Associations

2020 was certainly a challenging year for Associations with the COVID-19 pandemic and the impact it had on sport. Associations were resolute in working with Netball WA to ensure that netball competitions were delivered across the state. with 62 of the 74 Netball Associations managing to run some format of competition. COVID safety plans were developed and re-developed according to restrictions as the WA Governments COVID-19 road map phases were rolled out and implemented. The number of hours and amount of work undertaken by the Associations and their volunteer workforce cannot be underestimated and Netball WA thanks everyone for ensuring that the Netball community had the opportunity to play in 2020.

ZOOM became the primary form of communication and meeting platform. Netball WA Community Department and Association Presidents met monthly, and in the initial stages of COVID almost weekly whilst the COVID-19 protocols were being continually updated by our National Sporting body, Federal, State and Local Governments.

The Association Grants pilot was initiated in 2020 with four Associations. The Associations selected to pilot the Grants had existing staff in place as Administrators, and accredited Association Development Officers and Association Umpire Development Officers with structures and the expertise to deliver programs and courses. Although COVID-19 caused some alteration to the original KPIs, the Grants were successful in providing some additional funding resource for the Associations to carry out their roles, avoiding the duplication of delivery and resourcing from Netball WA.

#### **Regional Office Network**

#### 2020 was the second year of implementation of the Regional Office network from the Governance Review. Over the months of February and March the six Regional Offices delivered their Regional Forums which were well attended by Associations Presidents. Administrators, Association Development Officers (ADO) and Association Umpire Development Officers (AUDO). The Forums provided opportunity for Netball WA to deliver information and professional development through upskilling sessions and workshops to the Association personnel. It also provided opportunity for the Associations to network and share

Kalgoorlie was the host town for the Wheatbelt Goldfields Regional Forum and was run in conjunction with the West Coast Fever pre-season game against NSW Giants, providing the opportunity for participants of the Forum to view both games and speak to the teams coaching staff and Suncorp Super Netball umpires at the conclusion of the games. Port Hedland hosted the North West Forum with Associations as far away as Kununnura, Broome and Derby attending. Denmark hosted Great Southern Regional Forum with all Associations attending. South West forum was held in Busselton and Peel held in Mandurah. Midwest Gascoyne Forum was held in Geraldton with the Associations that could not attend in person Zooming into the sessions. Sessions delivered at the Forums included:

- Child safeguarding
- Volunteer Retention & Engagement
- Complaint handling
- Risk Management Planning

- Conducting effective meetings
- Succession planning and upskilling
- ADO & AUDO area specific upskilling

Despite COVID-19 and its impact on staffing in its initial stages, Netball WA staff continued to work with the Associations and Clubs in their regions.

As staff returned to work and Associations commenced planning for competition, innovative ideas and solutions for servicing were initiated. Many strategies to service and provide upskilling and engagement opportunities to Committees, coaches and umpires were implemented. Administration, coach and umpire upskilling and workshops were developed and delivered via ZOOM. Various governance topics were delivered via ZOOM including Working with Children Workshops and Social Media.

Regional office staff attended professional development training and planning days in Perth in March and August 2020.

#### Regional Office - Coach / Player & Umpire Development

To ensure that there was still strong engagement with coaches, umpires and players, the Development and Officials Coordinators in conjunction with Sport Development Unit, developed a number of initiatives that were implemented online such as:

- Green Shirt Program;
- Rules discussions and updates;
- Umpire Rule of the Week;
- a variety of Coaching workshops;
- Umpire Mentoring workshops;
- Selectors Course workshop;
- Talent Identification workshop;
- Skills sessions for athletes;
- Training session that could be delivered in the various COVID restriction phases.

Where visits to Associations were possible, staff enjoyed working with the committees and volunteer workforce. We look forward to 2021 and continuing building the relationships with our Associations. Regional Staff held quarterly meetings with Association Presidents, Association Development Officers and Association Umpire Development Officers to ensure that they were well supported and continued to have the opportunity to network.

#### NAIDOC Netball Carnivals

The Perth NAIDOC Netball Carnival took place on Sunday 15 November 2020 at the Gold Netball Centre and Matthews Netball Centre. Given the COVID-19 restrictions the event was well supported with 106 teams participating in the competition. For the first time in recent years the MC duties throughout the Opening and Closing Ceremonies were conducted by Aboriginal woman Kerry Stack.

The North West NAIDOC Carnival took place on Saturday 28 November at Broome Recreation and Aquatic Centre. The competition reached new heights and hosted a record 20 teams.

The Mid West NAIDOC and Aboriginal Youth Gala Day were both cancelled in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions, both competitions will be delivered in 2021.







#### West Coast Fever Cup

The West Coast Fever Cup Program was the most impacted program for Netball WA, with only 11 total competitions delivered across the four (4) terms of 2020: engaging 2,136 total participants.

The largest carnivals were hosted by the Mid-West Regional Office Staff, hosting a High School and Primary School Regional Carnival as West Coast Fever Cups.

#### School Partner Engagement

Netball WA's support and engagement with Schools Sports WA (SSWA), Associated Catholic Colleges (ACC) and Independent Girls Schools Sports Association (IGSSA) continues to improve year on year. In 2020, 216 girls and 22 boys teams contested the SSWA High Schools Cup. Unfortunately, COVID restrictions prevented the Senior High Schools Country Week and the Primary School Championships from going ahead and both were cancelled as a result. However, 18 teams participated in the Districts High Schools Country Week in September.

The ACC Championship Senior Netball Carnival was held in 2020 with 28 teams participating in eight (8) divisions. And in a new initiative for 2020, SSWA, ACC and IGSSA contested the Tri-Series All Star Games, held at the Gold Netball Centre. The three (3) teams played in a round robin competition with the inaugural winners being ACC.

#### Netball WA Aboriginal Grassroots Sites

In 2020, this program continued to engage and empower young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander girls, providing them with an opportunity to participate in netball and gain exposure to the Netball WA pathway. This year, eight (8) sites attended the Perth NAIDOC Carnival, with six (6) sites participating in the Netball WA Aboriginal Grassroots Sites program.

#### Goal 6: New and Emerging Markets

2020 has seen the ongoing engagement of the No Limits Netball Program with a total of four (4) sites running throughout the year with 59 participants taking part in a six-week training program. From there seven (7) teams from these programs competed in the annual FTG&P Association Championships. This saw the inclusion of one new Association in the program, Leschenault Netball Association, who had two teams participate in FTG&P Association Championships.



Our community netball carnivals saw the continued engagement of boys and mixed divisions throughout the year. The Multicultural Carnival saw 49 boys compete in the event.

The Perth NAIDOC and North West NAIDOC Carnivals also hosted a mixed division for the second and third years, respectively. This has seen some positive support with 13 mixed teams represented across these two carnivals.

Community netball has maintained some engagement with Walking Netball across 2020 via the support of upcoming programs in Albany and the Shire of Cranbrook.

Netball WA, in collaboration with Netball Australia, launched a revamped website early in 2020. The new design and technological improvement enhanced the user experience and customer journey for the organisation, as well as the implementation of using digital programs which enabled users to be directed to both Netball WA and West Coast Fever websites. A growth of 114,899 new users and a total of 345,395 page views was seen in this year across Netball WA's website.



#### Goal 7: Infrastructure and Facilities

#### Facility Development

Throughout 2020 key facility upgrades and redevelopments were undertaken at various Associations across Western Australia ensuring that netball is being supported by local, state, and federal governments with quality infrastructure, thus enabling the continued delivery and service to our sport and community.

Some of these developments included the completion of new clubrooms at Wanneroo Districts Netball Association, new clubrooms and resurfaced courts at Busselton Netball Association, resurfaced courts at Eastern Goldfields Netball Association, redevelopment of the Esperance Indoor Stadium to include the upgrade of existing courts and the construction of several new courts and major developments at the Broome Netball Association including realignment and resurfacing of courts, shade coverage of courts, grandstand spectator seating and state of the art lighting.

Major projects also received approval to commence in 2021 including court

resurfacing at Narrogin & Districts Netball Association and a major redevelopment of Belmont Netball Association with new sports lighting to be installed and the resurfacing of courts.

#### Netball Community Raffle

The 2020 Netball Community Raffle was launched on Friday 24 April. Due to COVID-19 restrictions tickets for the raffle were sold online only, with 9,181 tickets being sold, raising \$18,362 in funds.

The Netball Community Raffle is a strong fundraising mechanism for our Clubs and Associations, thanks to the ongoing support of the Gold Industry Group, Nissan, Flight Centre, RAC Arena and West Coast Fever. The Netball WA Community Raffle proceeds also go towards supporting the Netball WA Community Facilities Fund (CFF). In 2020, a total of seven (7) CFF grants were awarded, five (5) large grants and two (2) small grants, with the successful applicants being Lake Grace Pingrup Netball Club, Narrogin & Districts Netball Association, Belmont Netball Association, Geraldton Netball Association, Perth Netball Association, Fremantle Netball Association and Southern Districts Netball Association.

#### Goal 8: Fever Impact

Building on the connection between grassroots netball and West Coast Fever has been a key focus in a year disrupted by COVID-19.

2020 required an agile approach to marketing and communications activities to navigate new and ongoing COVID-19 related restrictions which have impacted community and high-performance sport throughout the year.

In an environment which saw the early postponement of community netball activities and the working lives of many West Australians altered, the need to stay connected with our community was more important than ever.

In April, a Netball at Home Series launched, which included community generated content, including netball activities and content from West Coast Fever athletes. This coincided with weekly livestream interviews with Fever players, an online watch party via social media and Fever Flashback content.

These activities connected our community and importantly provided an avenue to celebrate what makes our sport special, highlighting that despite the challenges, the hunger and passion for netball remains as strong as ever.

Despite Phase 4 COVID-19 restrictions being in place, West Coast Fever, in collaboration with Netball WA was able to deliver a full game day experience at RAC Arena on 15th July, where Fever took on the inaugural WA All Stars, at a time where our community was starved of netball. This event provided a wonderful platform to celebrate our sport and showcase the Fever game day experience.

A netball watch party extravaganza was also held at RAC Arena on Saturday 26th September which coincided with the 2020 Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships. All participating Associations for the championships were provided with a complimentary ticket to attend this event, which featured a live connected stream of the West Coast Fever vs Adelaide Thunderbirds game, along with a full sports presentation and family entertainment event. Over 5000 tickets were secured for this event.

The delayed Suncorp Super Netball and Winter netball seasons also provided the opportunity to amalgamate the two biggest WA netball awards nights of the year. Held on Saturday 14th November, The NET Ball hosted over 750 guests at RAC Arena in an event spectacular, which showcased the achievements of the Gold Industry Group WANL and West Coast Fever Suncorp Super Netball Seasons.

The WA community continues to support West Coast Fever by securing memberships and in 2020, 60% of all Fever members indicated in a 2020 survey that they are connected to a netball club in WA, with 30% securing a membership directly via one of the various membership offers in place which support the value proposition of being a Netball WA member.

#### Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships

The 2020 Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships were held on 26-28 September at Gold Netball Centre and Perth Netball Association.

There were 222 teams nominated from 29 Associations including seven (7) No Limits Teams and two (2) Boys teams, who participated in an exhibition match. Additionally, Netball WA entered two (2) Aboriginal All Stars Teams. For the first time in many years, no international teams participated in the 2020 event.

The Competition ran across the three (3) days with teams and spectators cooperating with entry and exit protocols and with much positive feedback surrounding the inclusion of 'Playing Hubs' each day. The event proceeded under a 4000-patron limit capacity at Perth Netball Association approved by the Town of Cambridge.

The Official 2020 FTG&P Association Championships Opening Ceremony was held at RAC Arena as part of the West Coast Fever Watch Party.

#### Origin Energy Metro League

Following a successful inaugural Metro League season in 2019, Origin Energy came onboard as naming rights sponsor for the 2020 season. Unfortunately, the 2020 Origin Energy Metro League season was cancelled after five rounds due to the impact of COVID-19. As a full set of fixtures was unable to be completed, and no finals were played, there were no champions or Most Valuable Player awards disseminated for 2020. Umpire Coaching, Coach Mentoring and Athlete Talent Identification were key components of the competition again in 2020, however with the season cancelled, the impact of these actions was also limited.

#### Gold Industry Group West Australian Netball League

Despite the season start date being delayed due to COVID-19 restrictions, the 2020 GIG WANL season was completed uninterrupted and included 14 Preliminary Rounds, and a three (3)-week Finals Series at Gold Netball Centre.

During Preliminary rounds, matches were played across five (5) venues including Gold Netball Centre, Mandurah Aquatic and Recreation Centre, Eaton Recreation Centre, Curtin Stadium and Mundaring Arena. Netball WA successfully ran three (3) themed rounds, including Gold Industry Group Round, Belt Up Round and Indigenous Round.

The Opens and Men's Semi Final matches and the Opens, Men's and 20U Preliminary Final matches and the Open, Men's and 20U Grand Final matches were livestreamed on CentrePass. Grand Final matches were watched by 5800 (20U), 6700 (Opens) and 6900 (Men's) people via Facebook livestreaming.

In November, identified NWA staff, umpire coaches and umpires from the High Performance Umpire Program engaged in two workshops with an independent consultant to review the 2020 season and overall program. A re-designed annual program, a new program/squad name have been developed and a new NWA staff structure to support this program will be put in place for 2021.

Three (3) National A Badges were awarded across the GIG WANL season, with a former member of the squad in Justin Barnes, awarded his National AA Umpires Award during the Suncorp Super Netball competition.



#### Netball WA Targeted Coach Program

High Performance Coach, Jill McIntosh was engaged to work with the Gold Industry Group WANL and State Coaches. One-onone coach mentoring sessions were held, with additional group upskilling sessions also offered. Due to COVID-19, upskilling sessions were moved to an online platform and were well attended by our coaches.

#### Netball WA Bench Officials Program

COVID-19 provided some disruption to the NWA Bench Officials Program. There was a reduced capacity operating at GIG WANL with most round matches only having 3-4 bench officials on the score bench instead of the usual five (5). This was lifted to five (5) per bench for the GIG WANL finals series. NWA has undertaken a recruitment drive at the end of 2020 and early 2021 to increase the number of bench officials available for the 2021 GIG WANL season.

Goal 11: Pathways

Despite the disruption of the 2020 year, there were many achievements made across all Netball WA Pathway Programs. These included:

#### National Coach Accreditation Scheme (NCAS)

The NCAS Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) were reviewed in early 2020, with the following numbers achieved for each level of coach accreditation as of December 31, 2020:

109 (454% KPI)

Development Coach Accreditation Actual

Additionally, NWA delivered a series of online coach education sessions during the height of the COVID-19 period, which were exceptionally well received by the community. It is likely that these sessions will be continued to be developed and rolled out in 2021 where required.

#### Athlete Identification

A guideline for athlete identification was developed and delivered at all events which took place in 2020. A clear process of how athlete identification is conducted at the various levels of competition throughout the State has also been developed. Overall a total of 280 athletes aged 14-19 years were identified at various state-based competitions from GIG WANL to Fuel to Go & Play Association Championship. Many of these athletes will be invited to trial for the 2021 State Teams and make their way into GIG WANL teams or underpinning programs.

#### **Regional Academy of Sport Program** (RASP)

The Department of Local Government Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) Regional Academy of Sport Program (RASP) review was undertaken in late 2019, with the release of the review findings and recommendations in 2020. The Sport Development Unit and Regional Office staff continue to collaborate with DLGSC regional offices and RASPs to ensure regional athletes have opportunity to develop their skills and talent in their home environments and that identified athletes, coaches and officials secure regional scholarships and athlete travel subsidy funding. The South West Academy of Sport (SWAS) continues to lead the way in the RASP space, with several athletes selected in the NWA 17U and 19U State Teams, and the ANL/Fever Academy Programs. Netball WA continue to work with all the RASP providers to build on the current programming and netball opportunities available.

#### Workforce Development

The growth of our workforce is ongoing. Focus in 2021 will again be on growing the depth and quality of the workforce. There have been a number of new presenters (Development and Intermediate) upskilled in regional and metropolitan areas. More depth is still required particularly with



Elite Assessors (i.e., High Performance Coaches). Former High Performance coaches have been re-engaged and will continue to utilise their skills for Elite and Advanced assessments.

For continual improvement there has been a focus on upskilling NWA staff to ensure consistency with the delivery of assessments across Intermediate and Advanced.

Mentoring was conducted over the Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships, whereby Association Development Officers were upskilled on how to mentor coaches within their Associations. This was successful and will be expanded so that mentoring can continue within their own Associations.

# National Officiating Accreditation Scheme (NOAS)

#### Umpiring

The NOAS saw major disruption due to COVID-19 impact. Associations and the High Performance Umpire Panel did some outstanding work in the short season to get umpires ready for assessment for their Badges with both A and C Badges exceeding KPI and estimates for further growth in these numbers before the end of 2020. The current NOAS KPIs as of 31 December, 2020:

#### **3 x National A Badges** (150% of 2020 KPI)

**10 x National B Badges** (100% of 2020 KPI)

265 x National C Badges (265% of 2020 KPI)

B Badge numbers are down with the shortened winter season and many Associations running shorter games being significant obstacles to coaching umpires for their badge and assessing the umpires. (1,138 – 227% of 2020 KPI) Rules Exam

#### Green Shirt Program (GSP)

600 umpires undertook the Green Shirt Program in 2020 across 20 Associations. The online delivery of the GSP proved successful for umpires from smaller associations to assist with continued engagement in a disrupted 2020.

The final umpire identification list has been completed and will be used to establish a state-based umpire depth chart. Overall, 179 umpires were identified within Associations across the state. A percentage of these will make their way into the various tiers of the High Performance Umpire Program, whilst others will be monitored and invitations to umpiring development opportunities will be offered across the 2021 year.

# STRATEGIC PILLAR 4: BUSINESS PERFORMANCE

#### Goal 12: Governance

If ever the strength of our governance processes and systems was to be tested, then 2020 was the year.

Two significant items caused a major impact across NWA in 2020 - COVID-19 and the WCF Compliance Breach, testing and stretching our governance processes to their limits. Although vastly different in outcome and nature, both will ultimately result in significant learning and improvements at both operational and governance level regarding processes and systems.

COVID-19 saw the development of our CAT (Critical Advisory Team), implemented as a cross organisational committee to support effective decision making in the rapidly changing environment, we found ourselves in during the early months of the pandemic. This proved to be a most effective process at both a Governance and operational level.

The WCF Compliance Breach resulted in the establishment of a Compliance Committee to oversee and advise on related issues, while supporting Netball Australia and the Commission in its investigatory process. Regrettably the fact that these breaches occurred highlighted deficiencies in our Governance, culture and internal systems, process and controls which we already have and will continue to review, revise and enhance as necessary so as to ensure such will not recur.

Representation across our committee structure has broadened to include all our subsidiary organisations in 2020. The Nominations Committee continue to review Board skills and experiences necessary to lead our organisations into the next period of the sport's future. Our Governance and Risk, Finance and Audit Committees provide oversight of key areas of our operations in support of our Boards, with the Awards & Recognition Committee continuing to promote and celebrate the rich history of our sport.

#### Goal 13: Partnerships

It has been an exceptionally challenging year in which to attract new partners. The COVID-19 pandemic had a sudden and significant impact on investment decisions in the business sector. Marketing and sponsorship budgets, in particular, are typically amongst the first to be cut back in times of great uncertainty and this was certainly the case in 2020. The first priority of the Commercial team was to manage the impact of a rapidly changing situation, focusing on developing plans for the delivery of partner agreements under rapidly changing scenarios, with a view to delivering as much value, and retaining as much partner income as possible.

Partner Management Plans were developed for all Netball WA and West Coast Fever partners. They focused on:

- Delivering maximum value from assets still at the team's disposal;
- Enhancing and optimising digital strategies - giving partners additional exposure;
- Developing new and innovative campaigns to keep them connected to our broader audience;

Examples included the Gold Facts Campaign run over six (6) weeks, and live streamed interviews with Fever players presented by Linley Valley Pork.

As the threat to hosting Fever home games in WA became apparent, a great deal of work was done to develop alternative partner assets. Events formed a big part of this strategy:

• West Coast Fever v WA All-Stars exhibition game was staged at RAC Arena to a record non-competitive fixture crowd of over 4,600, delivering most of the regular season game day partner assets;

• A series of 12 Green Rooms

Experience corporate functions, targeting partners and Centre Circle members, was run through the Suncorp Super Netball (SSN) season to replicate the value forgone in the Green Room functions at RAC Arena. This concluded with a Grand Final viewing party for over 300, principally partners and other stakeholders;

 A number of these events were complemented with community viewing parties, including partner activations, principally in Yagan Square;

When Fever's best efforts to secure an SSN mini-hub in WA for the latter part of the season were dashed, a further pivot in strategy was required. A significant investment was made in a print and digital campaign for partners across West Australian News platforms - principally The West and PerthNow - which included a 16-page magazine lift-out in The West, delivering considerable advertorial exposure and value to our larger partners.

A TV Commercial campaign was also undertaken for Gold Industry Group, UWA and Healthway across Channel Nine's broadcast networks, again delivering considerable partner value.

As such, the focus for the major part of the year was on partnership development rather than partnership procurement, in response to extraordinary circumstances. However, by necessity this was short term development planning to ride out the pandemic and maintain all the value we could in our partner portfolio.

The pandemic has brought the value of community connection, and the part sport plays in this, into sharper focus. West Coast Fever's recent success and the positioning of netball as the largest female grass-roots community sport are reasons to be optimistic for what can be achieved in partner retention and procurement in 2021. Indeed, to date in 2020 it is a source of pride that across Netball WA and West Coast Fever, only one partner has been lost in the most challenging year that anyone can remember.

Our Government Relations Strategy has flourished over this period, including the launch of the Parliamentary Friends of Netball initiative at Parliament House, where more than 30 Members of Parliament attended. This was soon followed by the Friends of Netball Exhibition Match at the Gold Netball Centre on 6th November.

These activities are already strengthening our connection to government, with subsequent commitments being made to support both the expansion of Shooting Stars and our regional development footprint.

#### Goal 14: Financial Management and Commercialisation

A sustainable sport through the commercialisation of our Participants, Programs, Events and Infrastructure

Our sport's financial sustainability was certainly challenged and tested in 2020, with almost every revenue source impacted by the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Despite these challenges, a number of significant achievements underpinned our commercial activity across the year and laid a foundation for strong growth and recovery in 2021.

2020 saw Netball WA take significant steps towards developing its own MarTech Strategy. A large part of this project is developing and maximising our data capture capabilities. Netball WA currently has a range of data sources such as MyNetball, EventBrite, the Netball Live App and Campaign Monitor.

The 2020 season also saw Netball WA launch a new merchandise website using Shopify, adding another data collection point to the stack. This data will soon underpin a new digital strategy that will enhance our participants experience of netball membership and provide a more tailored, quality journey across the netball journey.

The marketing unit of Shared Services continues to implement and deliver plans and strategies across the business, with these growing in sophistication each year, appropriately reviewing, and learning from previous campaigns to ensure they are improving and becoming more targeted in purpose and audience.

Expanding on the digital marketing initiatives from last year, targeting new memberships and membership retention in the Netball WA space, the marketing team were able to grow the Spring into Netball initiative established over the previous two years with the development of the 'Grow Your Game' campaign. Using our partner in Marketforce to facilitate, this campaign sought to inspire potential netballers and returning netballers with the insight that Spring netball is the opportunity to grow gameplay, social circles, confidence and more.

The campaign ran for a month, targeting known and 'like' audiences across Facebook and Instagram with artwork and wording optimised to target predetermined demographics. The campaign received 3,279 clicks across the two platforms, doubling the number of 2019 and making over 787,000 impressions. As a result, the Spring netball program for 2020 exceeded its participant KPI's.

Adapting to the uncertainty of 2020, the Marketing team were also able to develop and implement new digital initiatives to remain engaged with our Netball WA members and broader audience with the introduction of 'Netball at Home'. This campaign highlighted the Netball WA pathway across all digital channels through videos, featuring Gold Industry Group Western Australian Netball League athletes, A-badge umpires, coaches and even West Coast Fever players. Demonstrating their at home training efforts, how they stay court ready and how they are still playing the sport they love during a time we could not gather this campaign was a successful driver in keeping community members engaged and inspired to return when restrictions lifted, which they did in numbers that surpassed re-forecasted KPI's for 2020 Winter season.

Throughout 2020 the Netball WA's marketing and sales plans and strategies kept the participant at their core with the aim to not only grow the sport in numbers but to also grow and support the community that is Netball in WA.

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#### Goal 15: Technology

2020 has highlighted more than ever, the critical role that digital plays within modern sport. This role is both core to service and support members, manage information and conduct research and analytics, however, importantly allows sports to build genuine connections with customers by tailoring targeted communications and products which meet the needs of customers, at the right time.

Agility has been required throughout a year of constant change, which has included COVID-19 imposed restrictions and the need to regularly adapt and review processes.

More than ever, our systems and communications channels have been critical to our ability to stay connected to our customers and our Martech strategies (major initiatives, efforts and tools that harness technology to achieve marketing goals and objectives), will play a critical role in 2021.

New platforms, including a digital publishing tool was implemented in 2020 which has enabled the digitising of event programs to improve the user experience and provide additional opportunities to integrate content and deliver additional value to commercial partners of netball.

Within the past 12 months, a new website has been implemented which boasts an improved user-journey and navigation platform, which has delivered an additional 114,900 new users to the Netball WA website.

This website has been key, alongside social channels to maintain the connection with the netball community in WA, and via content initiatives such as the #sharethenettylove campaign, which harnessed the power of social media to bring back memories of netball and connections during the height of COVID-19 restrictions in April. Digital transformation remains a key priority for the sport and several key systems enhancements will take place in 2021, including a new participation platform which will replace MyNetball. Scheduled for implementation in Spring 2021, this new system will offer an enhanced user experience and greater flexibility in the development of competitions. An implementation plan will be developed and rolled out in consultation with key user groups.

Scoping of additional technologies alongside Netball Australia will also develop further in 2021 enabling greater connectivity between Netball WA's systems.

#### Goal 16: Brand and Communications

Building on the foundation set in 2019 and development of the inaugural Netball WA Customer Value Proposition (CVP), the focus throughout an interrupted 2020 has been to stay connected, re-engage and develop further engagement with all members of the netball community.

This approach has been challenged throughout the year with COVID-19 related restrictions limiting the ability to engage with customers through traditional channels.

Digital innovation has played a key role throughout the year and initiatives such as the Netball at Home campaign, proved highly popular with netball drills, activities and light-hearted moments being shared across the Netball WA website and social media channels from April 2020, with over 8,000 views. This same period coincided with the launch of the #sharethenettylove social campaign, which experienced national exposure, with those most connected to netball taking to social media to share happy memories of the sport they love.

The ability for our sport to be agile, adapt and grow is based on a solid membership model and in 2020, the process has begun to conduct a comprehensive membership review to understand our strengths, challenges, ambitions and review alternative membership models currently in market. This project will be conducted alongside leading brand and market research agency, Marketforce, with insights and findings to be presented to the Netball WA members in 2021.







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
