Dear Association & GIG WANL Presidents and Primary Contacts and Club Contacts

Further to yesterday's update regarding Level 2 public health measures, the following details are provided to clarify capacity limits at indoor venues.

### Indoor Community Sport – 150-person cap

Indoor community sport is subject to the 2sqm rule, capped at 150 persons, however this only applies to players and spectators.

Coaches, Umpires, Bench Officials or Scorers and Timers, Team Managers, and anyone who has responsibilities at a place as an officer or employee or in some other capacity (including a voluntary capacity) does not need to be included in the 150-person cap.

Where there are multiple spaces within an indoor place, and each is separated by a sufficient dividing structure\* (see full definition below), those spaces are separate spaces for the purposes of this requirement. Please ensure that you check with your venue owner/manager regarding any multiple spaces within your indoor venue.

\* **Sufficient dividing structure** means a wall or other structure which:

- (a) substantially comprises material that is impervious to air flow; and
- (b) is anchored to the ground or floor in a way which ensures that it cannot be lifted or pushed apart; and
- (c) either:
  - (i) reaches from the ground or floor to the ceiling (or roof if there is no ceiling); or
  - (ii) starts from the ground or floor and is at least 2 metres high from the ground or floor to its lowest vertical point measured from the ground or floor.

Note: In addition to meeting these requirements, a sufficient dividing structure must comply with any other legal requirements applicable to the structure in any way, including any legal requirements relating to the structural integrity of the structure (such as, but not limited to, requirements typically imposed or administered by local governments).
