The Gold Round in Round Four will highlight and celebrate our ongoing partnership with Netball WA's Elite Partner the Gold Industry Group, GIG's support of Netball WA and the League is vital to ensure we can deliver a high-quality state league, season-afterseason.

A highlight of the GIG WANL calendar will be our First Nations Round on Sunday 28 May. The celebration will commence with a Welcome to Country and a special cultural performance which will continue to strengthen Netball WA and the League's connection with the traditional owners on which all netball is played. After the ceremony, all matches across the three divisions of GIG WANL will then be played at Gold Netball Centre to make it a very special day for everyone involved.

The Belt Up Round helps to push the Belt Up message further than to just players with the importance of the message from the Insurance Commission of WA being highlighted to spectators and viewers. Once again, the Belt Up ball allow the message to be delivered directly into the hands of the plavers.

Finally. I want to take this opportunity to wish all the teams, players, coaches, support staff, officials and volunteers all the best for the season ahead.



The Year of the Roar

The 2022 Gold Industry Group West Australian Netball League season will be forever etched as the Year of the Roar.

In a historic moment for the competition. the Western Roar became the first club to clinch all three divisions of GIG WANL on an amazing grand final day for the club.

The 2022 Open competition was hotly contested as Western Roar and West Coast Warriors both finished top of the table with 12 wins with only percentage separating the eventual grand finalists.

Southside Demons and Curtin Hamerslev Comets occupied third and fourth respectively after the home and away season with the Comets two games ahead of Rangers.

At the other end of the ladder, it was a tough year for Souwest Jets and Peel Lightning as they combined for three wins between them. While East Freo Sharks will take some solace out of their draw with the third placed Demons in Round Three

The Comets defeated the Demons in the first week of finals to set up a preliminary final with the Western Roar who were licking their wounds after a five goal loss to the Warriors.

With scores level at half time, the Roar kicked into gear dominating the third guarter. Scoring 17 goals to Comets nine goals, putting Roar in the lead by seven at the final change before they surged ahead to claim a spot in the finale.

After dropping the first final to the West Coast Warriors, the Roar avenged the defeat on grand final day.

In a topsy-turvy first half, the teams went into the main break level at 24 goals apiece and then the Roar struck.

Roar began to pull ahead of their rivals, as Warriors encountered setback after setback. Roar ran away with the momentum and became unstoppable in the third quarter. rattling their opponents with the sudden change of pace and determination and took a decisive 11 goal lead into the final term.

The Roar completing the club's clean sweep with a 58-40 victory. Roar coach Dylan McPherson was extremely pleased by his team's performance, especially in the second half of the match



"The team was fantastic. I thought we dominated the third quarter despite being hesitant at the start." McPherson said.

"We knew that Warriors were going to come out strong, but we just had to keep being aggressive and keep attacking."

Roar captain and goal attack Maddison Schultz was voted MVP, winning the medal with a perfect score from match officials.

It was a similar story in the 20/U. The Roar turned around the result from the first week of finals to defeat the minor premiers Peel Lightning 60-61.

Roar led at every change to claim the premiership as Georgie Cleaver and Rylee Hall both scored 30 goals.

In the Men's, the undefeated Roar completed a perfect season as they overcame the Curtin Hamersley Comets by 16 goals (61-45).







Men's Preview: Rapid Round and Chasing the Roar in 2023

The 2023 Gold Industry Group West Australian Netball League Men's Competition is shaping as another exciting season. Defending champions Western Roar will be looking to continue their winning streak after going through 2022 undefeated with a 14-0 record.

Looking to challenge the Roar will be grand finalist the Hamersley Comets, three-time champions West Coast Warriors and the improving Southside Demons.

In an exciting change to the Men's Competition, the third round of fixtures will see the teams play each other in a Rapid Round hybrid version of Fast5 netball.

Rapid Round will see only five players on court with different scoring areas meaning sides can score one, two or three points. All matches during this round will be short and sharp, with four 10-minute quarters with the team that wins the toss choosing the goal end and taking the first centre in the first and third quarters.

In the first six minutes of each quarter teams can score one and two-point shots and the final four minutes of each quarter, goalers can shoot outside the goal circle for a threepoint shot.

Reigning premiers Western Roar will be hoping to build on what was a very successful 2022 campaign.

Roar's squad will take on a new look and be a blend of youth and experience with some incredibly exciting, athletic and ferociously competitive young talent, who are ready to forge their own path in the Men's Competition.

They will be looking to their shooting end to once again be dominant with Max Denholm the key with his more than 90 per cent shooting percentage and ability to score 300 goals a season.

The Hamersley Comets are ready to build on last year's grand final finish and are eager to see the impact their newest additions will bring to their team.

The Comets have farewelled Joel Anderson and Blake Smith into retirement while Elliot Clark has relocated to New Zealand. Replacing them will be defenders Liam Bailye and Dale Mather, midcourters, the speedy Mark McCoach and the versatile Declan Mensing and Corey Goss will bolster the shooting line.

Southside Demons have retained a core group of athletes from last season and will be looking to continue building the foundation and style of play that is uniquely Demons. Coach Mandy Love said the Demons were also fortunate to pick up some exciting talent from their trials.

"We are looking at showcasing [that talent] throughout the season and the Rapid Round format.

"Our goal is to earn the right to play in the grand final and we are looking forward to challenging not only ourselves but all other teams in the process."

After narrowly missing out on a spot in last vear's decider, the West Coast Warriors are entering the 2023 season with a newfound energy and focus.

A new coaching team of Hannah Irving and Player-Coach Jason Heard are ready to claim back the premiership title and the team has been able to keep the core playing group from last year. Add in some talented young guns who are ready to step up and the team has a chance to reclaim premiership glory.

"There is a fresh energy and vibe within the group this year," Heard said.

"We were obviously disappointed to miss out on the grand final last year, but I think that has lit the fire for a lot of us.

"We know we have to come together as a team and perform under pressure if we want to improve. I have no doubt we have the right group to take it all the way in 2023."



The Warriors will be looking to West Coast Fever Training Partner Jerome Gillbard to lead from the front. The Australian Goal Shooter Gillbard said he was excited to see how the Warriors would go in 2023.

"We've got a few new faces, some exciting young talent, some more 'experienced' faces, which I think will put us in good stead for the season," he said.

"We were really disappointed to miss out on making the grand final last year and are out to make sure that doesn't happen again."

Gillbard said netball fans looking for excitement in 2023, needed to go no further than the Men's Competition.

"There have been a few changes across all four sides and it could honestly be anyone's game on each night.

"I think that makes for an exciting game to watch and hopefully a good spectacle for those that watch."The future of the Men's Competition is looking bright with Souwest Jets commencing their Mavericks Academy program aimed at young boys keen to hone their netball skills. The program will hopefully help the Jets to meet their goal of developing a Men's Team to make its GIG WANL debut in 2024.
