PRESIDENT'S REPORT **Craig Heatley**

Sunday, 3 July 2022 will be a date forever etched into the history of West Australian Netball as West Coast Fever won their maiden premiership - a premiership which was 25 years in the making.

Our first Suncorp Super Netball title is the reward for years of hard work, dedication and commitment and it was great that we were able to achieve this feat in front of a packed RAC Arena.

On behalf of Netball WA and West Coast Fever, I want to acknowledge the McGowan Government for its support and commitment to Netball and to attract the Grand Final to Perth. In particular, thank you to the Minister for Tourism, Honourable Roger Cook MLA and the Minister for Sport and Recreation, Honourable David Templeman MLA for their support and advocacy to ensure the Grand Final was played in front of our Green Army.

It is also important that we recognise the support all levels of government provide Netball as well as the work of the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries in helping us to grow the game at the grassroots level and achieve the ultimate success at the elite level.

Netball is also supported by the Parliamentary Friends of Netball who work closely with the Netball community to further and strengthen relations with our diverse communities across the State and explore the reach of Netball. Thank you to the co-convenors of the group, Honourable Mia Davies MLA and Honourable Samantha Rowe MLC.

This past year was also a period of change as we transitioned to one entity following the Organisational

Governance Review. Both Netball WA and West Coast Fever are now governed by one Board of Directors which has been a very positive change and has led to efficiencies both at a Board-level and throughout the business.

I want to thank the Directors for their commitment to Netball WA and West Coast Fever. Thank you to Natasha Aristei, Dana Sawka, Brendon Grylls, Jacqui Jashari and Trish Robinson for their hard work over the past year. Also, a special welcome to our two newest Directors Lisa Wynne and Skye Miller, who joined the Board following the 2022 Annual General Meeting.

The year has not been without its challenges and certainly we have all been given an insight into the changing nature of sport and the way in which all sports need to work with their partners at all levels.

It is important that I reiterate that Netball WA and West Coast Fever are extremely appreciative of the support we receive from all our partners. I strongly believe that, even though we were involved in some headlines this year, our relationship with our existing partners is as strong as ever. Netball is a very inclusive, exciting and community-minded sport which delivers benefits to players, supporters, coaches, officials and volunteers right across the depth and breadth of Western Australia, and I am confident we will continue to attract and build partnerships which benefit business and Netball.

Finally, I want to thank our Chief Executive Officer Simone Hansen and the Executive Team for all the work they have done over the past 12 months to ensure that Netball thrives from the grassroots to the elite level.





CEO'S REPORT Simone Hansen

This year has been a year in which our dreams came true.

West Coast Fever's first Suncorp Super Netball premiership was secured in front the Green Army who filled RAC Arena as we made history, defeating Melbourne Vixens and getting our hands on that elusive national trophy. What a night!

Congratulations to Head Coach Dan Ryan, General Manager Performance and Pathways Sue Gaudion, the playing group and support staff who will be forever remembered in our Club's history as the first premiership team.

I do want to mention and thank the McGowan Government for its support and assistance in securing the Grand Final in Perth. The atmosphere generated was electric and to win our maiden premiership in front of a packed out RAC Arena with 13,908 of our home fans was something extremely special.

We are certain that the positive flow on effects from the premiership will be felt for years to come, as we continue to strive to grow the game of Netball across the State.

Netball continues to be the largest female participation sport in Western Australia. We have 73 affiliated associations, more than 900 clubs and 47,000 registered playing members with our membership remaining steady over the past three COVID-19 impacted years.

However, it is vital that with more sporting options becoming available to young girls, that we continue to work hard to attract and retain netballers of all ages and abilities across the State.

We remain committed to growing the game and

providing not only traditional Netball programs but also programs which highlight the inclusive nature of the game such as Walking Netball, our No Limits Program as well as opportunities for boys and men to play Netball.

This season also saw the resumption of national championships following a hiatus due to COVID-19. A highlight was the 15s Schools Sport WA Netball Team, who won gold at the 2022 School Sport Australia Championship in July. The team also had four players selected in the All-Australian Team which bodes well for the future of Netball in our State. Our Marie Little Shield team travelled to Sydney in October and achieved their best ever finish, placing fourth.

While the impacts of COVID-19 were not as profound as previous seasons, clubs and associations across the State had to navigate an ever-changing set of restrictions as we all began to live with the virus. Netball WA understands that the past three seasons has seen an extra administrative burden placed upon our volunteers. We will be forever grateful for the extra time, effort and commitment all of our passionate volunteers undertook to ensure Netball could be played each and every week.

The 2022 GIG WANL Season may well become known as the Year of the Roar. After the Western Roar claimed the title in all three divisions, crowning them the undisputed champions of WA Netball.

This year was the first year of our partnership with Kayo Sports which helped us bring the action from WA's premier Netball competition into lounge rooms not only here in Western Australia but around the country.

On behalf of Netball WA, I want to make special mention of the Gold Industry Group and thank them for their ongoing support of our competition.



Internally, we made a number of changes and we restructured the business and systems to reduce our cost base and invest resources in the right areas and right roles. We have found better ways to work and more costefficient ways to ensure we are administering the game of Netball for all levels of the sport.

Given a significant reduction in our sponsorship revenue, Netball WA had a strong focus on cost reduction and cost management strategies throughout 2022 which were largely found across human resource and travel costs.

There was also a strong focus on revenue generating activities as we actively hunted for a new Principal Partner of West Coast Fever, which we secured in November 2022.

In addition, hosting the Suncorp Super Netball Grand Final and the positive flow-on effects from winning the grand final, such as an uplift in merchandise sales, also assisted to increase unexpected revenue opportunities.

Taking all of the above into consideration, Netball WA posted a loss of \$75,000 which was \$200,000 less than we originally budgeted.

Shooting Stars continues to grow in leaps and bounds. The program has expanded into an additional four communities in Western Australia and our South Australian program now includes Year 7 and 9 students at Whyalla Secondary College. We now operate 20 sites across Western and South Australia and work with more than 1,000 girls and of our 70 staff, 85 per cent are Aboriginal.

The year was not without controversy. The spotlight on the Australian Diamonds and Hancock Prospecting put Netball and the relationship between the sport and partners on the front and back of newspapers across the country.

Disappointingly, West Coast Fever and Netball WA were collateral damage to a situation which unfolded at a national level. It is important that I reiterate that our Club did everything we could to maintain our principal partner, but the decision was out of our control.

Our players and the West Australian Netball Community understand how important the mining sector is not only to Netball but to WA sport more broadly as well as government, business and the overall economy.

This understanding was highlighted when we signed Fortescue as the Club's Principal Partner for the next four seasons. It was also great to see Fortescue get right behind our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Participation and Pathway program as part of the partnership.

Thank you to Craig Heatley President of Netball WA, and our Board for their support and guidance throughout the year. It is reassuring as CEO to have a dedicated board behind an organisation whose passion and love for the sport ensure we make decisions for the benefit of Netball both now and into the future.

Finally, and most importantly, I want to thank the staff of Netball WA and West Coast Fever.

2022 has had its ups and downs and the success of Netball at all levels both on and off the court is because of the hard work and extra hours you put in, particularly through the winter months. Well done to each and every one of you for what you do for Netball in this State and I know the successes and positives of 2022 will help drive us as we look to continue to grow and develop Netball in Western Australia.

The 2022 GIG WA Netball League season was the year of Western Roar as the club won the premiership in all three divisions, Open Women, 20/U Women and Open

With only a few COVID-19 disruptions along the way, the 2022 season saw several teams moving up the ladder compared to 2021, with some unexpected results throughout the minor rounds.

A highlight of the year was being able to take an Open Women's match between Western Roar and West Coast Warriors to Karratha and showcase GIG WANL to hundreds of our North West Netball Members through clinics and coaching education, in addition to the match.

The Finals Series, played at the Gold Netball Centre, brought a total crowd of 1,956 spectators through the doors. The Grand Final was attended by a crowd of 1,121 which was a positive increase compared to 2021.

Just making the finals is a huge effort, let alone winning the Grand Final so a big congratulations to the following clubs who participated:

There was a change to the GIG WANL broadcast with Kayo Freebies being the new platform for viewing matches. The quality of the broadcast was outstanding and we would say the best Netball State League broadcast in the country. On average there were 3,000 viewers per round with 63 per cent of viewers watching it live and 37 per cent on demand.

Netball WA saw an increase of 60 per cent across all its social media platforms during the 2022 GIG WANL season with some great interaction between clubs, players and spectators.

The inclusion of Brightside once again as the Sports Presentation supplier for the GIG WANL Grand Final Day created a professional and thrilling atmosphere with fireworks, lights and music throughout the evening.

Following such a competitive season, it was fantastic to see so many players, coaches and club members attend the Jill McIntosh Awards Ceremony held on Saturday 10 September at the Perth Convention & Exhibition Centre. where the Jill McIntosh Medal and other major GIG WANL awards were presented.

In a new format for 2022, 37 teams converged on the Gold Netball Centre for the Origin State Cup from Friday 7 to Sunday 9 October with more than 2,500 spectators viewing the action over the three days.

The Origin State Cup provides the opportunity for players, coaches and umpires in the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Academy Program, Metropolitan Academy Program and Regional Representative Teams to compete against each other. The competition is one of the selection points for athletes, umpires and coaches into the next level of programs and pathways.

In the 20/U division, Wanneroo Districts Netball Association and Fremantle Netball Association both progressed to the grand final after undefeated pool rounds. In the closest match of the grand finals, Fremantle edged out Wanneroo by three goals

Two undefeated sides also faced off in the 16/U Grand Final with Metropolitan North Green defeating Metropolitan South Black 42-16.

In the 14 U competition, Metropolitan South Green and Metropolitan North Green were undefeated in the pool round, winning all five of their matches, before Metropolitan South Green defeated Metropolitan North Green by 12 goals in the grand final.

The Marie Little Shield WA State Team also rounded out its preparations for their national competition, taking part in two matches against the Netball WA No Limits team.

Perth NAIDOC Carnival

The 2022 NAIDOC Netball Carnival was a fantastic competition with a record breaking 122 teams and more than 1,000 participants attending the event held at the Gold Netball Centre and Perth Netball Association on Wednesday 6 July.

In 2022 Netball WA introduced the Mar-koort Hand Heart Award for overall MVP from each division. These awards were based on talent identification from our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander selectors across the day.

Told through the story from Aunty Rhonda Collard-Spratt, with the support of NAAC Member Kathy Rogers, the Mar-Koort Hand Heart MVP awards were presented to a player from each age division that demonstrates a commitment to the following statement:

"With my hand on my sacred heartbeat, I promise to have a good heart and a kind spirit in all that I do in life and in the game of netball to play in the true spirit of the game with teamwork, fairness and commitment. With my hand on my heart, this is my promise to the club and myself."

The 2022 event again saw a special NAIDOC netball used for games featuring Aboriginal artwork, selected from designs submitted by participants at last year's Carnival.

The unique NAIDOC Netball is proudly supported by the Insurance Commission to put the Belt Up message directly in the hands of NAIDOC Carnival participants.

The 2022 winning design was created by 16-year-old Lakeisha Whitby, who is a proud Wongutha/Yamatji artist from the Goldfields region and participant of the Leonora Shooting Stars program.

Lakeisha said she was proud when she heard that her design had been chosen for 2022.

"I was really happy and surprised to have my design picked," she said.

"The rainbow colours on the ball represent diversity and how Leonora Shooting Stars embraces all kids. Bush foods sustain us and the Shooting Stars nourish our development.

"Brown campsites represent opportunity in other areas and the colourful dots represent the excitement we feel when we have opportunities.

"Aboriginal colours represent pride, strength and culture."

The 2022 Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships, which is the largest community netball event in Western Australia, was held in Perth over the June long weekend with more than 3,200 players travelling from across the State to participate.

The Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships form part of the Netball WA Competition Pathway and are held annually to provide a representative opportunity for Associations' players, coaches, officials, managers and administrators.

The event is an important opportunity to develop, mentor and identify talented players, coaches and umpires, as well as a great chance for them to measure their progress against other Associations.

In 2022, 3,288 players and 284 umpires from 41 Associations across Western Australia participated in 39 divisions catering for 274 teams from 12/U through to Masters at the Gold Netball Centre and Perth Netball Association in Jolimont. This included four teams in a Men's division and 11 teams in a No Limits Division for players with an intellectual disability.

With the support of our partners and all the volunteers, officials, umpires and players that travel to participate, the Association Championships provides a fantastic opportunity for players and officials from across the State to come together on the netball court and enjoy three days of fun in Perth.

The Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships are always a highlight on the Netball calendar and Netball WA would like to acknowledge the hundreds of volunteers and staff involved in making the event possible.

Regional Office

Regional staff engagement with our Associations, the Department of Local Government Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC), local government bodies, politicians, schools, businesses and potential local sponsors assist Netball WA in building the capacity and profile of the sport across WA.

Regional Forums were held across WA with each Forum tailored to the needs of the region's Associations. The Forums, an important event on the NWA calendar, provides the opportunity to collaborate and upskill key Association personnel ensuring growth capabilities in our volunteer workforce.

An invitation for NWA to present at the DLGSC Pilbara Sports Forum in July provided the opportunity to showcase Netball's achievements in the Pilbara and network with other sports and stakeholders.

Regional Academy Program

Regional Academy Program is a State-wide network supporting regional-based identified athletes, coaches and officials allowing athletes to continue their development and progress along the athlete pathway from their home environment and is pivotal in supporting the Netball WA Pathway. 2022 saw the further development of the programs in the South West Academy Sport (SWAS) program, Great Southern, Pilbara and Wheatbelt Goldfields. Funding for the program comes from DLGSC and NWA. Collaboration between multiple stakeholders is required for the success of these programs.





Netball WA GIG Tier 1 Leadership Camp

Netball WA with the support of our Principal Partner, the Gold Industry Group, delivered the Tier 1 Association Leadership Forum in October at the Gold Netball Centre. Tier 1 Associations from across the State attended taking part in workshops across the two days.

CEO Simone Hansen addressed the group providing important business updates. Other presentations from NWA included "Growing Your Membership" and "The Influence of Media."

Presidents from four Associations shared their knowledge and experiences on "Engaging with Local Government and Politicians", "Funding and Grants", "Media Relationships" and "New Market Programs."

Northern Star Resources Limited, Culture and Capability Manager Alisa Cardaci delivered an interactive session on Building Relationships and the Power of Influence, which created great thought and discussion and tied the theme for the weekend together.



Participation



Clubs and Associations

In 2022, Netball WA enrolled a total of 14,036 participants in Woolworths NetSetGO Programs within the Clubs and Associations of WA. Additionally, 3,972 participants registered multiple times to take the total Woolworth NetSetGO registrations for 2022 to 18,008.

There was a total of 420 approved Woolworth NetSetGO Centres in 2022 across WA. Within these centres there were a total of 866 Woolworth NetSetGO programs delivered.

Community Coaches

Throughout the year, a total of 55 community coaches were retained and/or recruited. Of these, 28 coaches were active, nine were new pending shadow sessions and an additional eight coaches on top of the 55 accredited were active in the WACE program deliverable Netball WA Community Coach pool.

Schools Programs

Sporting Schools

Netball WA delivered 94 programs engaging with 8,265 participants across all four terms in 2022. Included in these numbers was the new inclusion of the Sports Australia initiative of "Club Connect", with this being introduced late in 2021.

ScoolNet

In 2022, Netball WA delivered eight ScoolNet programs and engaged with 408 participants through the ScoolNet. Independent ScoolNet programs were delivered by Netball WA Community Coaches

West Coast Fever Cup

Over the school year of 2022, a total of 2,997 participants were engaged with 21 West Coast Fever Cup carnivals. These carnivals are a great tool for Netball WA to engage with participants, as well as increasing the brand awareness of West Coast Fever with all these participants receiving a Fever squad poster and a certificate.



Participation Partners

- Through Netball WA's partnership with the SEDA College WA, 48 school clinics were delivered that were able to engage with 7,003 participants.
- Through Netball WA's partnership with School Sport WA (SSWA), we were able to connect with the SSWA Champion Cups, Country Weeks and high school 'Schoolgirls' competitions. Through this partnership, Netball WA were able to engage with 4,493 participants.
- Through Netball WA's partnership with Associated & Catholic Colleges of WA (ACC), 12 carnivals were delivered that were able to engage with 3,056 participants.

These partnerships are vital in allowing Netball WA to connect with our primary and high schools throughout the whole of WA. In 2022 these partnerships have allowed us to engage with a total of 14,552 school aged participants.



Specialist Schools

Across 2022, Netball WA maintained 12 endorsed Specialist Schools with seven Tier 1 and five Tier 2 status. As a component of the program, Netball WA delivered umpire and coach upskill sessions in the schools with a total of 767 specialist school participants are engaged through the Specialist School endorsement.

For the first time, Specialist Schools participants were involved in the State Cup weekend. A Specialist Schools 'All Star Team' was submitted, made up of players from various Specialist Schools, who competed in the weekend against the Fever In Time teams.

Going into 2023, Netball WA have onboarded two new Tier 2 Specialist Schools, Kinross College and Harrisdale Senior High School.



Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Programs

Netball WA facilitates and delivers several programs and events in the community to develop and promote health, wellbeing, education and leadership opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

Grassroots Program

In 2022, nine Aboriginal Grassroots Sites ran programs for junior Aboriginal participants all across the State. A full review of the 2022 Grassroots Program and site delivery has occurred, and is still occurring, with clear direction and recommendations for the new year and beyond. From this, Netball WA was able to secure funding of \$30,000 from the Confident Girls Foundation to action a three-year plan to re-design and further grow the Grassroots Program.

NAIDOC Carnivals

The Perth NAIDOC Carnival was held during NAIDOC Week with 122 teams participating and Regional NAIDOC Netball Carnivals were hosted in Mid West (Geraldton) and Goldfields (Kalgoorlie) regions, with 15 and eight teams participating in these carnivals respectively. Unfortunately, due to the impact of COVID-19, the Aboriginal Youth Gala Day Carnival was cancelled due to a lack of team registrations and the North-West NAIDOC Carnival was cancelled.

Moving into 2023, Netball WA, in consultation with the Netball Aboriginal Advisory Committee (NAAC), have made the decision to change the name of the Perth NAIDOC Carnival to Boorloo NAIDOC Carnival. Boorloo is the traditional name for Perth, the land where the carnival will be held. Additionally, the Mid West and North West NAIDOC Carnivals will now take place prior to the winter netball season starting on the first weekend in April.



Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Academy

An additional program delivered in 2022 was the re-designed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Academy, which ran over the winter season, culminating with the team participating in the State Cup weekend. The program was extremely successful, but further learnings for continued re-design and development has been identified for action in 2023.

Netball Aboriginal Advisory Committee (NAAC)

The Netball Aboriginal Advisory Committee (NAAC) was re-established in 2021 to provide culturally appropriate advice and recommendations on various aspects of Netball WA's policies, programs and services as they relate to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) communities. In 2022, the Committee served their second year of a twoyear term. They focused on reviewing events and carnivals as well as upcoming programs and processes moving into 2023. It is through the NAAC, as well as the organisational Reconciliation Action Plan that NWA will continue to strengthen the relationship between Netball and our First Nations People.



Inclusion & Diversity Programs and Carnivals

No Limits

The No Limits Netball Program continued to succeed and reach new heights in 2022 as the program was delivered at 12 sites to 238 participants.

The program, through the support of the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries and Healthway Targeted Participation Program Grant Funding was able to expand from eight sites to 12 and 110 participants to 238.

All sites were serviced, with a number engaging in Netball WA upskill sessions on top of the visits. Each program was reviewed providing opportunities, vital information and feedback for improvement in 2023. Netball WA already has additional sites on board for further growth in 2023.



Marie Little Shield

Marie Little Shield trials saw 21 participants in attendance, carrying though to the announcement of a 12-player squad with two additional training partners. The squad competed in Sydney and were able to experience their best ever result, playing in a Bronze medal game and eventually finishing fourth overall.

Additionally, WA's own Sarah Arnstrom was awarded the Naomi Perry Spirit Award, which is awarded to a participant who has demonstrated great sportsmanship and enthusiasm towards the event.



Multicultural Carnival

Netball WA hosted another successful Multicultural Carnival with a total of 89 nominated teams across 31 schools seeing 1,068 participants taking part in the full day carnival event. 640 of those participants identified as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander and/or having at least one parent born overseas.

Walking Netball

The Walking Netball Pilot program, delivered via funding from the Healthway Innovation Challenge Program Grant, was finalised and acquitted at the conclusion of June. The pilot was incredibly successful with Netball WA engaging with 493 participants, nearly twice the KPI of 250.

Following this pilot, Netball WA has begun to establish the program within its regular suite of programs and experienced an incredibly successful spring season.

During the Spring season, there were 337 participants registered at seven different sites across the State.

2022 Multicultural Carnival

Netball WA celebrated multiculturalism as hundreds of young netballers from more than 50 schools took to the courts for the 2022 Multicultural Carnival at the Gold Netball Centre and Perth Netball Association on Friday 26 August.

Thanks to Netball WA's continued partnership with the Insurance Commission of Western Australia, promoting the Belt Up message, the carnival featured a bespoke ball designed by a proud Wongutha/Yamatji artist and Shooting Stars participant Lakeisha Whitby.

The rainbow colours on the ball represent diversity and how Leonora Shooting Stars embraces all kids. The Aboriginal colours represent pride, strength and culture.

Now in its ninth year, the partnership sees the Belt Up road safety message delivered to more than 240,000 netballers every year throughout Western Australia. As one of the largest sports in the State, Netball provides a strong platform to communicate the importance of belting up in the car.

As part of this commitment, each team playing in the Multicultural Carnival received Belt Up balls courtesy of the Insurance Commission of Western Australia to spread the Belt Up message and help push the game of Netball across the State.

I am confident that we will look back upon 2022 as a landmark year for our Performance and Pathway Unit with the success of West Coast Fever and our maiden Premiership. It is the same year that the West Coast Fever Netball Club expanded to encompass more than 60 athletes, from our Futures and Academy Programs to West Coast Fever Reserves, our West Coast Fever Women's and Men's Training Partners and our thriving West Coast Fever Team.

This expansion has increased coaching and umpiring opportunities in our High Performance system, including the successful recruitment of Fever Head Coach Dan Ryan, as well as strengthened integration and connection between Elite and Talent Programs. An increase in our community footprint was evident with the Club delivering more than 840 hours throughout the year, assisting in the growth of our Fever brand and developing further the skills of our Club's role models and ambassadors.

The Western Australia Institute of Sport has again played a pivotal role in the support of our aspiring athletes and supporting our ongoing strategy to deliver West Australian athletes to Suncorp Super Netball and Australian representation.

In our pursuit to grow the Netball Pathway to provide the best platform for our players, coaches and officials to become elite, the expansion of our Fever In Time

(FIT) Program to include Metro Academies as well as our first Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Academy (and a Men's academy in the future) was significant. We are excited for the future of FIT across the State and the opportunities for all pathways to be connected and linked to our High Performance system.

As COVID-19 continued to impact society, flexibility and innovation remained key in 2022 and this was evident across all programs of our Performance and Pathway Unit. Delivery of Coach and Umpire courses saw 753 Coaches accredited and 309 Umpires badged, whilst coach and umpire education reached more than 1.900 participants across the State via both online and faceto-face delivery models. Talent Identification remains a key focus of the Performance and Pathway Unit ensuring 'eyes' are at all key competitions throughout the State.

The connection and collaboration of the Performance and Pathway Unit and its achievements in only our second year has been inspiring. I would like to thank all staff and contractors for your work ethic, passion and hunger to be successful and look forward to growing our pathways and connections in 2023 and to driving sustained success throughout.

From the Head Coach

West Coast Fever, 2022 Suncorp Super Netball Champions. A premiership 25 years in the making.

Writing these words still seems so surreal and the fact that we were able to produce our best team performance when it mattered the most, was the stuff of dreams.

When I first began my role as the head coach in September 2021, my vision and goal was crystal clear; 'add value to what was already in place and take this team to heights it has never been before'. After an extensive handover period and three solid months of information gathering, a plan to 'consolidate, evolve and inspire' was put in place. And so, the journey towards our maiden premiership began.

Our theme for the season was 'Together we own our story. Our team, our choices, our opportunity.' Its purpose was to connect and empower us, to understand that we had everything we needed at our disposal to be successful and at the end of the day it was up to us to make it happen.

Our mission was 'Becoming Championship Material'. Because to become a champion, you must become championship material first. Its purpose was to ensure we had left no stone unturned in our preparation and that when the ultimate moment of opportunity arose, we would be ready and truly believe in what we could become. It became the driving force in our environment every day to ensure we had all the required elements to become a championship winning team.

There were several other key areas that would become the cornerstone of our success. It was vital we honoured where we had been as a club and team, accept where we were at, and acknowledge where we needed to go. We needed to dive deeper into our relationships, connections, and team dynamics. We redefined our team values, making them more meaningful and personal. Passion, excellence, grit, team first, family, would be become the core of our Fever culture. We needed to evolve and progress our game plans and trademarks, adding more skills and strategies to our tool kit.

We needed to raise our standards and benchmarks in elite behaviours, our champions mindset and in personal and team growth. We needed to be willing to get uncomfortable, to be vulnerable and openly speak about what we wanted to achieve and how we were going to do it. And most importantly, we needed to develop a healthy relationship with pressure, one where we could thrive and shine when it was all on the line.

The home and way season was tough. COVID-19 impacted most teams, most weeks. It was highly competitive and extremely unpredictable each week. The more adaptable and resilient you were and the stronger your depth, often determined the outcome of matches. We certainty had our fair share of challenges, but with every challenge, a door of opportunity presented itself.

Fourteen players wore the green dress in season 2022. Courtney Bruce captained the side with Jess Anstiss elevated to the vice-captain position. Jhaniele Fowler and Sasha Glasgow formed a formidable shooting duo, complimented by the speed of Emma Cosh. Alice Teague-Neeld excelled her new role as the team's general in Wing Attack and helped bring out the best in Verity Simmons in the middle. Club stalwart Stacey Francis-Bayman and Sunday Aryang provided relentless pressure in defence and new recruit Rudi Ellis provided a point of difference in the circle.

Ellis made her debut in Round 1 against Sunshine Coast Lightning, as did training partner Zoe Cransberg in Round 6 against the Giants. Former contracted Fever players Chelsea Pitman (training partner) and Shannon Eagland (training invitee) both returned to team and played significant roles on court throughout the season.

We won 10 of 14 matches in the regular season, breaking team scoring records and individual milestones as Jhaniele Fowler continued to prove why she is the greatest. We dropped both matches to the Melbourne

Vixens and suffered narrow defeats to the Giants and Firebirds. We finished second and secured our place in the major semi-final. It turned out to be the best possible position to be in.

Heading into the semi-final against the Vixens, we felt a shift in our momentum and that it was all coming together at the right time. We were 'poised to strike' and that's exactly what we did, as we stunned the title favourites on their home turf, claiming a nine-goal win and a spot in the Grand Final.

Grand Final day was a moment in time that we will never forget. A packed RAC Arena of more the 13,000 fans, the Green Army in full voice, with pulsating energy, it was simply magical. Our on-court performance was the culmination of everything we had trained for, prepared for, spoken about, visualised, all unfolding in front of our eyes. Every single player and staff member was in the zone that day, with an unbreakable focus to get the job done. 'Whatever it takes' to be 'unstoppable', was the message and that's exactly what transpired as we claimed an 11-goal win over the Vixens, 70-59.

When the final whistle sounded and that elusive premiership was finally ours, the emotion was overwhelming for everyone. Words will never do justice to what that moment felt like or meant. Often you hear the word 'relief' after a final win, but there was none of that, it was pure joy, elation and incredible pride. 25 years of striving, all worth it in this very moment. As we soaked it all in, looking around at the sea of green in the stadium, we could see how much this win meant to so many people. Those moments will stay with us forever.

Congratulations to the iconic Stacey Francis-Bayman on her retirement at the end of the season. She ends her six years at the club as a premiership player. She gave it her all every time she stepped foot on that court and bows out at the top of her game. Thank you, SFB!

2022 has been very special and it will be very hard to beat (but we can get better). Thank you to all the athletes, the high-performance team, service providers, officials, sponsors, families, past players, alumni, the Green Army, our fans, Netball WA and the wider netball community, this one will always be for you. It was a moment 25 years in the making, and you, were all an integral part of it.

This was OUR premiership success and we all created history together!

Coach Education Overview

Netball WA continued to deliver a series of coach workshops which incorporated both online and face-to-face components, both regionally and in the metro area. Hybrid (online and face-to-face) courses were also developed to meet the needs of the COVID-19 environment and distance learning. West Coast Fever coaching staff were engaged to deliver components of two Advanced courses in 2022.

Increased numbers of coaches attended our Advanced and Elite Courses in 2022:

- 18 coaches attended Advanced Course (2 courses)
- 6 coaches attended Elite Course

Continued collaboration and professional development occurred in 2022 with our Regional Development Coordinators and Association Development Officers. This collaborative approach gives much greater oversight of the coaching talent coming through the pathway.

Coach Identification

Coaching mentoring occurred throughout 2022 with 70 coaches mentored across Pathway competitions. Identified coaches were provided with opportunities at the next level.

Athlete Identification

Athlete identification was conducted in collaboration with Associations, GIG WANL Clubs and across the Pathway competitions in 2022. This approach provided an opportunity to identify any gaps and allow Netball WA, Associations and GIG WANL Clubs to target and shape their development programs more effectively across:

- Developing Talent Challenge;
- GIG WANL;
- FTGAP Assoc Championships; and
- Regional Championships.

Identified athletes were invited to participate in the Fever in Time Metro Academy and Regional Academies to attend the 2022 State Cup. West Coast Fever Performance Staff attended at the State Cup across the weekend and identified athletes were invited to attend the 17/U Futures trials.

The Fever in Time Program provides an important platform for athlete identification, education and skill development.

Workforce Development

Development of our workforce continued in 2022. We continue to utilise our Performance Umpires and Coaches to provide upskilling and mentoring within Pathway Programs. Pathway coaches will be utilised to conduct talent identification at Pathway competitions.

Coach the Coach training will be available through the Learning System for all Performance Umpires and Coaches in 2023.

Umpire Education Overview

Netball WA delivered a series of umpire workshops which were extremely well received by the community, both regionally and in the metro areas. We have seen increased engagement from Community umpires through to our Performance Umpires.

The following numbers achieved for the Netball WA Umpire Workshops for 2022.

Face to Face Courses

- 17 Coach/Tester Workshops (215 attendees)
- Eight Game Management Workshops (81 attendees)
- 24 Rules Discussion Workshops (483 attendees)

Green Shirt Program

The Green Shirt Program provides Associations with a beginner education program for Grassroots Community umpires. In 2022, 21 Associations delivered the program with 209 participants successfully completing the course. This program continues to build a sustainable umpire workforce within Associations across the State.

Umpire Identification

Identification of Umpires and Umpire Coaches was conducted at FTGAP Associations Championships, GIG WANL and Regional Championships in 2022. Umpires identified were invited to participate in the Fever in Time Metro Umpire Academy and Regional Umpire Academies and invited to attend the 2022 State Cup. Based on performances at State Cup, identified umpires received invites to attend the State Umpire Performance Program trials in January 2023.

- 59 umpires identified at FTGAP Associations Championships
- 79 umpires mentored at State Cup and Metropolitan and Regional Umpire Academies
- 24 Umpire coaches identified within Metropolitan and Regional Umpire Academies
- 34 umpires selected to umpire at GIG WANL

Bench Officials Identification

Twenty-nine Bench Officials were selected to this year's GIG WANL Bench Officials Squad. This was an increase of seven from the previous year. This increase was due to a Statewide recruitment drive and will be built on in 2023. The GIG WANL Bench Officials Squad attended a Netball WA upskilling session which consisted of theory and practical components.

As the business emerged out of the COVID-19 pandemic, Quarter One saw residual restrictions in place which had a level of impact on our commercial business, however these were eased in the outer months allowing both event and sponsor activations to resume at the levels not seen since 2019. The success of the 2022 SSN campaign for the West Coast Fever had a positive impact on our sponsorship acquisition including the signing of Fortescue as the new Principal Partner of West Coast Fever in November 2022. Thanks, must also go to the full suite of commercial and corporate partners through the year who once again provided the solidity for our success in both the community and elite aspects of our business.

2022 saw Netball's partnership with the Gold Industry Group continue to flourish with the investment continuing to provide a platform for success via a multi-channelled brand and activation strategy into both community and elite Netball throughout the State.

In October, Fortescue joined the Netball WA signing a four-year Principle Partnership with the West Coast Fever which will see dual branding Fortescue Metals Group/Fortescue Future Industries assets across key West Coast Fever assets as well as significant investment into our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander pathway products.


2022 KEY PARTNERS



Fox Sports/Kayo were officially unveiled as the SSN's new and exclusive broadcast partner, signing a five year exclusive deal. The total number of matches broadcast on Linear TV throughout the SSN season has almost doubled, from 33 in 2021 to 60 in 2022. West Coast Fever averaged a viewership of 30k per match (approximately one third Kayo viewers, two thirds Fox Sports). This was the second highest average in the league.

On average, Kayo Sports generated 35% of Gross viewership per club, with the Fever the second most watched team on both Kayo and FOX Sports



The 2022 Grand Final was secured by the McGowan Government and ultimately played host to West Coast Fever and Melbourne Vixens at RAC Arena in a huge coup for the sport and the broader West Australian sporting community. A record crowd of 13,908 attended the game - the largest in the sports history as West Coast Fever secured its maiden premiership.

Regular season attendances at West Coast Fever home games consistently outperformed the average attendance across the league in 2022. Despite venue capacity restrictions in Round 1 and Round 5.


WCF HOME GAME ATTENDANCE (EXCLUDING FINALS)






