





# **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

The past 12 months, while at times challenging for our sport off the court, has presented some amazing opportunities, where we have been able to grow our game at all levels across Western Australia.

One of these opportunities was the release of our 2023 Strategic Plan which our CEO, Executive Team and Staff have already started implementing as we look to Play, Grow and Inspire Netball in this State for now and into the future.

I have no doubt that as we work to achieve what is set out in the Strategic Plan, Netball will become the sport of choice for all, we will become better connected with all areas of the WA community and there will be greater opportunities for the next generations of netballers to take to the court, whether that be on a Saturday with their family and friends or in front of a sell-out RAC Arena in the Green Dress.

The plan readies us for the next few years with State and Federal Elections on the horizon and as the competition for sports funding becomes greater as the Brisbane 2032 Olympic Games rapidly approaches.

On behalf of Netball WA and West Coast Fever, I want to acknowledge the ongoing support our sport receives from the State Government. In particular the Minister for Sport and Recreation, Honourable David Templeman MLA and the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries. The State Government, Minister and Department's support is integral to the success of West Coast Fever and Netball WA, helping us to compete on the national stage as well as growing the game from NetSetGO right through our Community Netball and inclusion programs.

Our sport is also supported by the Parliamentary Friends of Netball, who work closely with the Netball community to strengthen relations across the State and create real benefits for Netball and the people who play, coach, umpire and administer our game. Thank you again to the co-convenors of the group, the Honourable Mia Davies MLA and the Honourable Samantha Rowe MLC.

A highlight for 2023 has been the continued success of our Shooting Stars program that is now supporting more than 1,200 girls in 23 locations across Western Australia and South Australia. The Shooting Stars Program was born out of a Netball WA pilot initiative back in 2014 and it has been pleasing to see our Boards, Executive and Staff working in partnership to further expand and build on the success that has already been achieved. I want to thank the Directors of our Board for their commitment to Netball WA and West Coast Fever. Thank you to Natasha Aristei, Dana Sawka, Trish Robinson, Lisa Wynne and Skye Miller for their hard work and expertise over the past 12 months. Thank you to Brendon Grylls and Jacqui Jashari who both departed the Board over the past year. Both Brendon and Jacqui are passionate about our sport and their contributions to Netball have been highly valued.

We welcomed Glenda Kickett and Nadia Mitsopoulos to our Board, both have made an immediate impact around the Board table. Glenda joins the Board as Netball WA's inaugural First Nations Director, bringing with her extensive professional skills, experiences and cultural knowledge. Nadia joined the Board in September and brings 30 years' experience as a journalist

and broadcaster in television and radio with the ABC, GWN, Channel 10, Channel 9 and the Associated Press in London.

In 2024, we will look to continue our work in enhancing our governance structure to ensure we have frameworks and people with a range of skill sets and experience to help guide our organisation for the years to come. We will seek to reduce some of the complexities and red tape around electing and appointing members to the Board and by attracting professionals with strong connections and diverse backgrounds, we will create opportunities to grow our game at the strategic level.

Finally, I want to thank our Chief Executive Officer Simone Hansen, the Executive Team and the entire Netball WA and West Coast Fever staff for all the work they have done over the past 12 months to ensure that Netball thrives from the grassroots to the elite level.

# **CEO REPORT**

The year 2023 has been another massive year for Netball on and off the court in Western Australia.

Netball WA released its 2023-25 Strategic Plan which at its heart is an enduring vision for a strong and sustainable future, underpinned by excitement, passion, and inspiration. We believe our new strategy has the opportunity to take Netball to places it hasn't been before in Western Australia. The plan will ensure we are focused on the people that play our great game, that we grow Netball across this State and we inspire the next generation to reach for and achieve their netballing dreams.

An offshoot of the strategic plan is the need to ensure we have the facilities to keep up with not only the growth in our sport, but the growth in Western Australia's population. Our Strategic Facilities Plan has been developed throughout 2023 providing us with a Netball-specific plan to guide court refurbishments and new facility developments across the State. A key priority for our sport is to make sure we have enough places to play both now and into the future.

With a State Election due in March 2025, the Strategic Facilities Plan will help us to inform all sides of State Politics, as well as Local and Federal Governments, to ensure Netball is front of mind and successful in obtaining funding commitments in the lead up to the election.

West Coast Fever had another incredible season securing our first Team Girls Cup on the Gold Coast and reaching the Suncorp Super Netball (SSN) Preliminary Final. The dream of back-to-back premierships sadly ended with a heart wrenching one-goal loss in Sydney to the Swifts. Our home games at RAC Arena were the best attended in the league with more than 56,000 fans flocking to experience the best game day experience in SSN.

We broke our regular season home game attendance in back-to-back weeks against the Sunshine Coast Lightning (10,764) and the Giants (11,013), both games attracting more fans than any other SSN game including the Grand Final in Melbourne. This was capped off by a record membership with more than 5,200 fans joining the Green Army in 2023.

Off the court, by mid-December we had signed a new Team License Agreement with the league which is perpetual in nature. The finalisation of the Team License Agreement is great news for the long term future of our sport, providing certainty and clarity for all stakeholders. Our Club is locked into Suncorp Super Netball for the long term and that is something all WA Netball fans should be extremely excited about.

At the same time, we finalised a new Collective Player Agreement (CPA) between Netball Australia (NA), the Australian Netball Players Association (ANPA) and the other Suncorp Super Netball teams. While the agreement was signed almost three months after the expiration of the previous agreement, it meant that we were able to sign our new squad for season 2024 and begin preparations for another big season of Suncorp Super Netball.

The upcoming SSN season marks the introduction of the newly formed Melbourne Mavericks in place of the Collingwood Magpies. Meanwhile, there will be changes at West Coast Fever as our newly contracted team of players aims to build upon our Preliminary Final berth from this last season. It is an exciting time for the Club



as we look to continue to grow on and off the court and we want everyone to come to RAC Arena, join the Green Army and Experience the Fever.

Across our community, Netball continues to be the number one female participation sport in the State. In 2023, we had more than 49,400 people playing Netball, with more than 14,600 of those participating in one of our NetSetGO programs.

We have also continued to run successful programs across the State aimed at increasing participation and making our sport inclusive for all. Our ATSI Programs across the State had more than 3,800 participants and our centrepiece Boorloo NAIDOC Carnival attracted 100 teams with more than 1,200 netballers taking part. Our No Limits Programs continues to break down barriers and encourages players with an intellectual disability to experience our sport.

We are working hard in the Boys and Men's Netball spaces to grow the game in this market with a new Boy's Competition piloted in October after we had more than 100 boys and men take part in the Fuel To Go & Play Association Championships.

The GIG WANL competition continues to improve year after year, delivering a higher level of competition and raising the bar for aspiring netballers. With each passing season, it proves to be a dynamic platform for the growth and development of the game. This season we saw an amazing Grand Final Day at the Gold Netball Centre with the Hamersley Comets winning their club's maiden premiership at any level in the 20/U. Before the Hamersley Comets Open side clinched their first Open Premiership in a remarkable day for the club.

The steps forward we made on and off the GIG WANL court have been extremely pleasing as we looked to simplify the league's model and we are now positioned well to continue to improve the stability of the competition and raise its profile within the West Australian sporting landscape.

Off the court, it was extremely pleasing that Netball WA recorded a bigger than expected surplus in the year ending 2023 of \$306,794, which is an improvement on the deficit we recorded in the previous financial year of (\$74,444). The higher-than-expected surplus is attributed to an increase in grant income received from Netball Australia as well as receiving two grants from the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries in the same reporting period.

The ever-impactful Shooting Stars program continued to grow from strength to strength. As a culturally responsive education engagement program, Shooting Stars continues to empower, support and advocate for more than 1,200 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander girls and young women across their 23 school-based sites in Western and South Australia. All Shooting Stars sites saw an increase in engaged participants throughout the year. Furthermore, new sites were launched in Wyndham and Bindoon, along with a new outreach program that was established in Narrogin as a southern hub for surrounding areas such as Wagin, Boddington, Pingelly and Brookton.

Late in 2023, we completed the search and appointment of a new Executive Officer of Glass Jar Australia with

Helen Ockerby being appointed and starting in January 2024. Helen is a Bardi-Jawi, Noongar woman with ties to the north and south of Western Australia. It brings immeasurable value that an Aboriginal woman will be leading our passionate Shooting Stars team as the program continues to empower Aboriginal girls and women.

While Helen is new to this role, she is certainly not new to the organisation. Playing a key role in the delivery and growth of the Shooting Stars program, Helen was Kimberley Regional Manager from 2016 until 2020 and was one of the program's first staff members.

2024 marks 100 years of Netball in WA and we cannot wait to celebrate our centenary. Throughout the year we will be holding a number of events and activities to highlight our game and the role it has played in developing and supporting communities since 1924.

The first Netball games were played behind a building on St Georges Terrace back in 1924 and when you consider that next season West Coast Fever will be playing the same sport in front of sell-out crowds at RAC Arena, it shows just how far our sport has come over the past 100 years.

Part of the activities will include a book depicting the 100 years of Netball in this State and activities around the Fuel to Go & Play Association Championship which I am sure will be the perfect way to commemorate and celebrate our history.

I want to thank our partners of Netball WA and West Coast Fever. Your support of our sport in this State is vital to our successes on and off the court, from the grassroots right up to the national and elite level and we look forward to your ongoing partnership with Netball in Western Australia.



# **GENERAL MANAGER REPORT**



## Beth Harvey COMMUNITY

For many competitions, programs and events across all levels of Community Netball, 2023 was the first uninterrupted year post COVID-19.

There was much excitement and a flurry of activity in the Community Department planning the calendar, visits, trips and most importantly re-connecting with Associations, members, stakeholders and schools. This planning set the scene for a fantastic year of achievements across Participation and Community Netball.

Netball membership continued to grow with 34,778 registered players from Juniors through to Masters, up from 33,943 in 2022.

As a sport with a robust and broad base, the foundations established for players, coaches and umpires through the NetSetGO modified program cannot be underestimated as this entry level program continues to be an important focus for Netball WA. So it was pleasing that Woolworths NetSetGO numbers increased to 14,624 in 2023 rebuilding after several COVID-19 impacted seasons.

Spring Netball has become a hotly contested competition in many of our metropolitan and regional Associations with Mixed Netball and Walking Netball rivalries developing and opening participation opportunities for non-traditional markets. Mums, dads, aunts, uncles, sisters and brothers are getting out and having a go at our fantastic sport.

Our Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships held over the WA Day long weekend in June, while a wet and stormy affair, did not dampen the spirits of competitors who descended on Perth from all over WA. This flagship event also played host to 18 teams from Singapore schools and clubs providing their players and coaches with valuable international experience. For our WA players and coaches, it provided opportunity to be exposed to different styles of Netball. At the championships, we also acknowledged Rusty Hazel and Liz Seiber for their outstanding contributions to Netball in this State with our Service to Sport Awards.

Regionally, our West Coast Fever Cup competitions grew exponentially in 2023 with Netball WA hosting huge numbers in the Wheatbelt Goldfields and Great Southern regions, where they also celebrated 30 years of this event. Featuring primary and secondary school engagement, Netball WA looks forward to further expansion of the West Coast Fever Cups in metropolitan and regional areas in 2024.

We will defend and extend our junior participation in the face of greater competitive forces from other sports. MEASURE OF SUCCESS 10% increase in the number of participants engaged in school programs

Following several years where being in schools was a challenge due to COVID, 2023 provided an opportunity for NWA to re-ignite important programs for students and critical relationships with teachers. The NWA Teacher Ambassador program grew to 116 following a campaign in August 2023 after a period of decreased engagement.

The NWA Schools Engagement Strategy has been prepared and provides a new baseline for the Participation Team and Regional Staff to continue to grow and develop this important pipeline for transition to more formal netball programs across the state.



STRATEGIC PRIORITY We will defend and extend our junior participation in the face of greater competitive forces from other sports. MEASURE OF SUCCESS New Strategic Facilities Plan approved.

Commencing in May 2023, a comprehensive tendering process was undertaken to identify the Consultant to undertake the preparation of NWA's new Strategic Facilities Plan [2023-2033]. CCS Consulting were appointed in July 2023 and the work began in earnest. With facilities the most challenging area for Community and Competition netball in WA at present, this plan is significant and will ensure sustainability and longevity for our sport.

The following steps were undertaken with a draft plan presented to NWA in December 2023:

- Strategic context and literature review
- Technical review
- Benefit analysis Scoping of benefits
- Stakeholder engagement Survey and workshops conducted to analyse needs across sport
- Situational Analysis
- Facility compliance

# STRATEGIC PILLAR

STRATEGIC PRIORITY We will extend our male and Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islanders participation and realise growth in

these highly valued segments.

MEASURE OF SUCCESS Feasibility study completed and baseline data captured for boys/men.

Boys and Men's netball was in the spotlight throughout 2023, being showcased at the elite level with the Australian Kelpies playing warm-up games prior to the Constellation Cup International series in October between the New Zealand Silver Ferns and the Origin Australian Diamonds. Locally, the Australian Men's and Mixed Netball Association (AMMNA) National Championships were hosted in Perth in April 2023. WA, through the West Coast Men's and Mixed Netball Association (WCMMNA), were represented by 6 teams including the Open Men who finished Premiers and the 23 Under Men finishing Runner Up. This provides an additional pathway for boys and young men who are wanting to continue their netball from 12 Under competitions.

In order to understand the next steps in the Boy's and Men's pathway and to ascertain modeling of a potential competition to "bridge the gap" between 12 Under (where boys can play in competitions alongside girls unrestricted) and current NWA competition opportunities at GIG WANL Open Division, a pilot competition for boys and young men was introduced. Collaborating with a working group consisting of representatives from 12 Associations who have an interest in growing Men's netball, the Junior Thunder League pilot was born. Conducted over 6 weeks in Spring 2023, the Junior Thunder League ran in a round robin format rotating between larger metropolitan locations Fremantle NA, Perth NA, Southern Districts NA & Wanneroo Districts NA.

58 registered players between 14 and 17 years of age represented Perth NA (2 teams), Wanneroo Districts NA (2 teams), Kalamunda Districts NA (1 team), Amazonz Netball Club (1 team), Independent's (1 team) with South Midlands NA, Eastern Hills NA, Swan Districts NA & Southern Districts NA all contributing players to make up the total teams.

Coaching sessions run by Lyn Pemberton for 9–12 yearolds occurred alongside the competition and focussed on developing key netball skills then implementing them into a game simulation, and included 14 participants.

Following the pilot competition, a survey was released to all members to provide feedback and give NWA further direction to the competition and pathway moving forward.

MEASURE OF SUCCESS 10% increase in participation numbers across Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander programs and pathways.

The 2023 Boorloo NAIDOC Carnival was held at Gold Netball Centre and Perth Netball Association on Wednesday, 5 July with 100 teams, 700 players, 75 umpires and 1,750 spectators in attendance. This is an annual event which is important to the participants and Indigenous community. This year's carnival was the first time Netball WA used its new name Boorloo NAIDOC for the 20th carnival which is part of NWA's NAIDOC Week celebrations.

The change came about after extensive consultation with the Netball WA Aboriginal Advisory Committee, which determined that renaming our Perth NAIDOC Netball Carnival was the right move. The timing also coincided with Fortescue coming on as new Presenting Partner. Fortescue joined the Netball WA and West Coast Fever community late last year and provide support to both elite netball as well as our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander pathway programs.

Regional NAIDOC Carnivals were generously supported by Fortescue via travel subsidies and reduced registration fees for teams attending in Geraldton (Midwest Gascoyne) and Karratha (North West).



STRATEGIC PRIORITY We will diversify offerings and ensure our sport is inclusive to a broad range of social groups and abilities. MEASURE OF SUCCESS 15% growth in the number of No Limits and Walking Netball participants.

The Netball WA (NWA) No Limits Netball Program is a participation-based program for individuals that have an intellectual disability. No Limits Netball Program sites deliver weekly training programs and/or competitions to advance social and physical skills as well as drive overall mental wellbeing. These training sessions then lead into the No Limits division at the annual Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships, with teams competing in a one-day competition over the carnival weekend. There were 24 No Limits programs conducted across 13 associations during the year, with 280 participants involved. Three new centres were onboarded to the program in 2023: Rockingham & Districts NA, Success NA and Esperance NA.

Following a nomination and voting process driven by the Netball WA community, the Marie Little Shield team was

named the Western Swans in readiness for the National tournament. The Marie Little Shield is a competition for female players with an intellectual disability held at the Waverley Netball Centre in Melbourne from 15 to 17 September, with our WA team finishing fourth for the second year in a row, narrowly missing out on the bronze medal.

In 2023, there were 18 Walking Netball programs conducted across 11 Associations, offering this new opportunity to those wanting to enter or re-engage with our fantastic sport. Excitingly, four new centres also offered either a come and try session or a pilot in 2023, namely Rockingham & Districts NA, Success NA, Albany NA and Port Hedland NA.

# **GENERAL MANAGER REPORT**



## Sue Gaudion PERFORMANCE & PATHWAY

This year, we launched the 2023-2025 Netball WA High Performance Plan focusing on a journey towards sustained success and being courageous in our pursuit for medals and championships. To achieve this, our game plan is to establish champion leaders and a powerful culture, robust athletes and connected pathways, a strong and bold Premiership Club, coaches, umpires and officials motivated to succeed and competitions that ignite and excite.

In arguably one of WA's most successful performance years, West Coast Fever featured in the finals for the fourth year in a row, falling agonisingly short of a chance to defend their maiden premiership. West Coast Fever Reserves also featured in finals at the Australian Netball Championships finishing fourth, while our WA 19/U team played in a National Netball Championship Grand Final, finishing with silver, and our WA 17/U team also played finals, securing with a bronze medal.

Our Pathway Team led the delivery of coach and umpire education across the State to more than 3957 participants with 598 coaches accredited and 406 umpires badged. Fever in Time increased numbers of athletes, coaches and umpires feeding into NWA Pathway competitions and programs, while our State Umpire Performance Program continued to deliver success with strong performances at State and National levels. Bench officials were also recognised at Australian National Championships with an Elite accreditation being awarded and GIG WANL, our preeminent State-based competition, increased online viewership by 53 per cent with more than 64,000 viewers across the season.

Our High Performance and Pathway team have shown great leadership and unity in achieving such incredible results over the past 12 months. Their commitment to our vision of being the best on and beyond the court never waivers regardless of the challenges they are presented with. Thank you for your dedication and commitment in our pursuit of medals and championships.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY

We will continue to build on the success of West Coast Fever and grow the talent of tomorrow through evolution in high performance pathways. MEASURE OF SUCCESS 3rd place finish 4th consecutive Finals Series: League Record 4 athletes with international representation.

West Coast Fever had another successful season, marking their fourth consecutive finals series and fifth appearance in the past six seasons. The West Coast Fever training environment provided a platform to allow athletes to grow and perform at their best, which culminated in four athletes achieving international representation this year. Our development of athletes outside the West Coast Fever contracted playing list has also contributed to the elevation of training partner, Jordan Cransberg, to a contracted athlete for the 2024 season.

We continued to champion diversity within our club through the selection of four male training partners, who continue to challenge and elevate our training environment. This had the additional benefit on the WA Men's Team winning the 2023 National Championship. For the first time ever, the West Coast Fever Reserves also added male training partners into their training environment.

Developing the holistic athlete continued to be prioritised with all 10 athletes either completing university degrees or working alongside their roles as West Coast Fever athletes. Jodii Maguire (Athlete Wellbeing Lead) and Scott Hancock (Player Development Manager) worked closely with all athletes to ensure they are focusing on developing themselves off the court as well as on it.

# STRATEGIC PILLAR

STRATEGIC PRIORITY Through connected pathways and competitions, we will identify, support and celebrate talented players, coaches and officials to ensure a thriving pipeline of Western Australia talent.

MEASURE OF SUCCESS Bronze (17/U) and Silver (19/U) Medals at National Netball Championships. Fourth place finish at Australian Netball Championships. 11 athletes selected in Australian 17/U, 19/U and 21/U squads.

2023 was a highly successful year for athletes throughout the Netball WA Pathway. In April at the National Netball Championship, both teams were able to achieve a spot in the finals with the 17/U WA Team finishing with a bronze medal and the 19/U WA Team securing a silver medal. From this tournament, WA had 10 athletes identified and invited to Australian camps. In August at the Australian National Championships, the West Coast Fever Reserves finished in fourth place, with one athlete invited to Australian 21/U camp.

The Netball WA Coach & Umpire Conference was held with more than 150 coaches and umpires in attendance. The Conference was designed to connect and inspire community coaches and umpires through a series of professional development sessions, which will provide the tools and insight to build the capacity and ability of coaches and umpires. The conference was followed by the launch of the Peer Network, which aims to connect West Australian coaches, umpires and officials and provides a platform to educate, upskill and inspire. The Peer Network will include a series of online education sessions to be held during 2024.

Mentoring and identification of athletes, coaches and umpires occurred at Fuel To Go & Play Association Championships, GIG WANL, WANL Futures and Regional Championships in 2023. Identified athletes, coaches and umpires were invited to participate in the Fever in Time Program and attend the 2023 Origin State Cup.

# STRATEGIC PILLAR

#### MEASURE OF SUCCESS

Establish tool to track and compare WANL competitiveness to assess overall performance improvement.

In 2023 the Gold Industry Group Western Australian Netball League (GIG WANL) was managed within the Performance and Pathway department of Netball WA. In coming across, the focus has been to improve the standard of the competition and expose participants to high performance environments week in, week out, giving our players, coaches and officials the opportunity to thrive under the pressures of elite competition.

A GIG WANL Advisory Panel was established in 2023 to review the financial and operational model. The panel identified changes to be implemented in 2024, these include the addition of a fifth men's team and changing to a 21/U competition, increasing the age from the previous 20/U division.

2023 also saw Brightside Live come on board as our broadcast production partner. Brightside Live produced

a quality product and we continued to stream on Kayo in 2023. We had 64,737 total views of GIG WANL in 2023, this is an increase of 53 per cent from 2022.

The 2023 season saw nine GIG WANL matches take place out of the metropolitan area, with four games held at Eaton Recreation Centre and five games at Mandurah Recreation and Aquatic Centre.

On the court, Hamersley Comets won their first GIG WANL Premiership with their 20/U team having a solid win against the Southside Demons. Not to be outdone by their junior counterparts, the Hamersley Comets Open team took out the club's second premiership with a win over 2022 Premiers, Western Roar. In the Men's, the Western Roar continued their domination with a win over West Coast Warriors.

The Commercial, Media, Marketing, and Events functions are responsible for driving 60 per cent of the organisation's revenues, underpinned by key brand and consumer focused traditional and digital content for Netball WA and West Coast Fever.

The Commercial Department drives the acquisition, retention and servicing of sponsorships, corporate partners and our retail footprint ensuring the sustainable growth of our organisation.

The Media Department meticulously crafts our narrative, delivering captivating content across diverse platforms to engage and inspire our global fan-base.

Simultaneously, the Marketing Department orchestrates innovative campaigns, fostering brand loyalty and connecting our values with our audience.

Our Events Department creates and delivers unforgettable experiences, from electrifying West Coast Fever Game Days to signature gatherings, creating a holistic and immersive connection between our brand and its enthusiasts.

Together, these pillars form the backbone of our enterprise, propelling us to new heights in the exhilarating world of professional sports.

In 2023, the organisation welcomed a number of new partners across both Netball WA and West Coast Fever.

RSM, Nova 93.7 and the CBH Group are notable standouts and joined the ranks of Netball WA long term Principal Partner the Gold Industry Group and Principal Partner of the West Coast Fever, Fortescue.

Healthway promoting the Fuel to Go and Play message renewed their commitment to netball extending their partnership tenure to over 25 years.

Generating exposure for our partners and their associated brands is a key function of the department and in season 2023, West Coast Fever cumulative QI Media Value across all media types including broadcast, was \$6.9m finishing ahead of all other teams.

Key to many successes have been our engagement throughout our sport's ecosystem and provided much need leveraging assistance in our regional footprint through our Regional Championships and NAIDOC carnivals.

Revenue diversification continues to be generated through our retail offerings and gross sales exceeded budget targets by more than 60 per cent, demonstrating both the strength of our brand, retail offerings and the successful execution of our tactical marketing strategies. As a percentage of total business income, 39 per cent was generated through commercial and consumer.

West Coast Fever and Netball WA Social Media Channels all experienced an increase in followers, likes and profile visits during 2023.

Fever's 19.5 per cent increase in Facebook audience was the biggest in the League and when you add in the increase in Instagram (17 per cent), LinkedIn (23.7 per cent) and TikTok (58.4 per cent) the Club has clearly grown its audience.

The Club also ranked 3rd overall for Gross Viewership on Foxtel and Kayo Sports, inclusive of all games throughout the season. Fever's viewership increased by 35 per cent from season 2022.

The home game match day program also experienced significant growth with an 800 per cent increase in impressions throughout the season from Round One to the Minor Semi Final and it recorded a 7,400 per cent increase on season 2022.

In the Netball WA space, Facebook likes increased by 7.8 per cent and profile visits increase by 256 per cent. While on Instagram, followers increased by 8.7 per cent and profile visits were up by almost 40 per cent.

The GIG WA Netball League also showed significant growth with the Grand Final match day program having a 3,800 per cent increase in impressions compared to 2022.

Netball WA entered a second year of a partnership with Kayo Sports, streaming GIG WANL live and free on Kayo Freebies. This partnership ensures first class coverage of GIG WANL, allowing supporters the opportunity to watch games they are unable to attend or re-watch the most exciting moments. Each year our total viewership increases, which resulted in an impressive 64,737 viewers in 2023.

MEASURE OF SUCCESS 5,000 West Coast Fever Members

The 2023 Suncorp Super Netball Season saw record crowds at West Coast Fever home games. Off the back of another finals appearance for the team, West Coast Fever attendance, game by game ticket and season memberships scaled to unprecedented levels, cementing the Club as the powerhouse of the League.

West Coast Fever memberships have seen incremental growth since the commencement of the Suncorp Super Netball League and have achieved a 49 per cent increase from 2019, the last pre COVID season. Growing a strong connection with fans and members was a pre-determined strategy and underpinned our Martech project, launched in 2020. By providing the organisation greater clarity in our data insights and analytics capability. This has ultimately led to our success in our campaign execution. More than 36,000 match by match tickets were issued throughout the 2023 season and in turn generated record gross ticketing revenues, further emphasising our brand strength and investment into the match day experience.







After a number of COVID-19 interrupted years, 2023 provided many highlights for the Gold Netball Centre (GNC).

The GNC continued to be the home of the West Coast Fever and Netball WA Pathway programs. GNC was the central venue for the Gold Industry Group WA Netball League (WANL). 2023 was the first year the WANL Grand Final day was held on Court 1 with a temporary grandstand providing an enhanced spectator experience.

Netball WA community events were also hosted at the GNC. In conjunction with Perth Netball Association, the Fuel To Go & Play Association Championships, Boorloo NAIDOC Carnival and Multicultural Carnivals were all highlights on the Netball WA calendar.

The netball competitions continued with the GNC hosting the 12's and 14's School Sport National Championships. Further to the Nationals, GNC also hosted School Sport WA's Senior High School and District High School Country Weeks. The staff at GNC hasve continued to work to diversify bookings. The centre now services many social sports such as volleyball, badminton and pickleball. These bookings allow the venue to fill off peak periods. Martial Arts and Fencing continue to grow within the centre and resulted in GNC hosting the Karate Federation of Australia and Taekwondo Australia National competitions, along with a Fencing WA National Camp.

Overall, the Gold Netball Centre has grown the number of hirers in 2023, providing not only a venue for elite and community Netball, but for a diverse range of sports at elite/pathway and social levels. With an increase in user groups, the venue has still managed to achieve an overall satisfaction of 89 per cent and achieved 11,482 hours in court hire, a figure which is the highest court hire usage since the centre opened in 2015.











# **ASSOCIATION CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Western Australia's biggest Netball and arguably largest sporting event in the state, the Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships were held in Perth from 3 – 5 June as more than 300 teams and 3,500 players braved wet conditions in an action-packed long weekend.

Games were played across 43 Divisions ranging from 12 and Under and Junior Boys all the way to Masters Women.

In the end, 23 Associations won trophies with Perth Netball Association winning the most with six.

Southern Cross recorded their very first trophy in the Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships, taking out the Open Women 4th Division 14-10 against North Midlands.

# NWA YOUTH ADVISORY GROUP

NWA's inaugural Youth Advisory Group (YAG) was established in 2023 and is an important initiative of the National Principles for Child Safe Organisations, which states that children and young people are informed about their rights, participate in decisions affecting them and are taken seriously.

The Youth Advisory Group provides both a professional and personal development opportunity for youth involved in netball in WA. It is a platform where young people have an active voice in promoting child safeguarding in our sport, in addition to providing the youth perspective to other areas of our organisation. It also provides leadership opportunities for the youth members, that can be filtered back to their regions, associations, and clubs.

The group comprised of two NWA staff members and 8 young people with 6 meetings held during the year. The YAG members ranged in age from 16 to 22 and included NWA members from metro and regional areas. The YAG inaugural members provided insights and feedback that has not been received previously and allowed NWA to make changes to surveys and documents to encourage better participation. It has been not only important but also insightful to hear the points of view of our netball youth with regards to programs and competitions that NWA run.

# **SCHOOLS**

- WCF Cup: 31 West Coast Fever Cup Competitions throughout metropolitan and regional areas
- After School Clinics: 7 After School Programs
- Sporting Schools: 50 Coach delivered Programs, delivered by NWA Community Coaches and 48 Teacher delivered programs.

# **ATSI PROGRAMS**

#### **Boorloo NAIDOC Carnival**

The 2023 Boorloo NAIDOC Carnival was held at Gold Netball Centre and Perth Netball Association on Wednesday 5 July with 100 teams, 700 players, 75 umpires and 1,750 spectators in attendance. This is an annual event which is important to the participants and Indigenous community.

This year's carnival was the first time Netball WA used its new name Boorloo NAIDOC for the 20th carnival which is part of NWA's NAIDOC Week celebrations.

The change came about after extensive consultation with the Netball WA Aboriginal Advisory Committee, which determined that renaming our Perth NAIDOC Netball Carnival was the right move. The timing also coincided with Fortescue coming on as new Presenting Partner. Fortescue joined the Netball WA and West Coast Fever community late last year and provide support to both elite netball as well as our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander pathway programs.

Regional NAIDOC Carnivals were generously supported by Fortescue via travel subsidies and reduced registration fees for teams attending in Geraldton (Midwest Gascoyne) and Karratha (North West).

# **ATSI PROGRAMS**

### Aboriginal Grassroots Program and Youth Gala Day

NWA were successful in securing funding from the Confident Girls Foundation to support this program and this enabled all Grassroots sites to receive a visit from the NWA Participation Coordinator in 2023. After multiple years without any visits, the focus on 2023 was to rebuild relationships with existing Grassroots Netball Sites and to establish their requirements going forward. NWA also conducted an audit into the capacity of sites, to determine if they will continue to be a supported Grassroots site or if they are ready to be transitioned into a fully self-functioning Netball club. 2023 became a year of resetting parameters for the program and preparing for the future of the Grassroots program. The Grassroots sites competed in the Youth Gala Day at Southern Districts in April hosted by Southern Districts Netball Association. The Aboriginal Youth Gala Day forms part of one of the key community Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander events in the NWA calendar and is held annually to provide all junior Aboriginal participants with the opportunity to showcase their skills in a competition environment.

### **Aboriginal Development Academy**

2023 saw the development of a different format to previous years for the Aboriginal Development Academy, including a new name, improved selection process and training format. Rather than having a short program to get a team ready to compete in State Cup, the program had a holistic approach to netball to create the foundations for strong and confident future netballers. These included off-court behaviours of nutrition, stretching, and rolling for recovery, goal setting and reflection. On-court sessions were presented by a variety of Netball WA qualified coaches and provided different skill development opportunities week to week. The program culminated in a Hub Day where the Academy squad gained valuable matchplay against the Cook Island representative teams.

# INCLUSIVITY

### **Inclusive Participation Grants Program**

Netball WA was successful in its submission to the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) securing a 3-year grant agreement through the Inclusive Participation Grants Program. This funding is being utilised to expand our engagement and connection with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, particularly children and youth within the South-West, Peel and Great Southern Regions of Western Australia, to increase participation in our sport through numerous facets. The programs that are currently being planned through the funding are:

- A new culturally appropriate program specifically tailored to NetSetGO aged participants (5 to 11 year olds), in order to offer additional ways of engagement within the community and participation within the sport.
- A new annual NAIDOC Carnival in the South West Region, with a view to growing this to the Great Southern region in future years.
- Coaching and umpiring face to face workshops targeted to Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander officials.
- Upskilling of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Coach and Umpires to deliver future courses in their communities in a peer-led approach.

The funding is being used to set up programs to break down the barriers that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders face in trying to both play and be involved in Netball, and in turn increasing participation rates in the sport.

In December, the funding was used to bring 5 umpires and 2 coaches, from the Southwest and Great Southern Region to the Netball WA Coach and Umpire Conference, by covering the registration fees and providing a travel allowance.

### No Limits and Marie Little Shield

The Netball WA (NWA) No Limits Netball Program is a participation-based program for individuals that have an intellectual disability. No Limits Netball Program sites deliver weekly training programs and/or competitions to advance social and physical skills as well as drive overall mental wellbeing. These training sessions then lead into the No Limits division at the annual Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships, with teams competing in a one-day competition over the carnival weekend. There were 24 No Limits programs conducted across 13 associations during the year, with 280 participants involved. Three new centres were onboarded to the program in 2023: Rockingham & Districts NA, Success NA and Esperance NA.

Following a nomination and voting process driven by the Netball WA community, the Marie Little Shield team was named the Western Swans in readiness for the National tournament. The name is an ode to the iconic Black Swan, native to Western Australia, and is designed to give the team a fresh identity to drive standards on and off the court. The team also has a new logo, showing off the shape of the Swan. The Marie Little Shield is a competition for female players with an intellectual disability held at the Waverley Netball Centre in Melbourne from 15 to 17 September, with our WA team finishing fourth for the second year in a row, narrowly missing out on the bronze medal. In 2023, the Marie Little Shield is an example of how far the No Limits Program has come and the opportunity to experience the team spirit and watching their growth and development is inspiring.

#### Walking Netball

Walking Netball is a modified version of netball with a few adjustments to the traditional rules. It is a low impact version of the sport that emphasises injury reduction so anyone, no matter their age or physical capabilities, can participate. Walking Netball encourages adults to have a more gradual introduction or re-introduction to netball and physical activity by regaining basic motor skills, and encouraging balance, coordination, and better footwork. However, most importantly, Walking Netball provides an opportunity for participants to have fun, meet with friends and develop social networks.

In 2023, there were 18 Walking Netball programs conducted across 11 Associations, offering this new opportunity to those wanting to enter or re-engage with our fantastic sport. Excitingly, four new centres also offered either a come and try session or a pilot in 2023, namely Rockingham & Districts NA, Success NA, Albany NA and Port Hedland NA.



# MULTICULTURAL -

### **Multicultural Carnival**

The 2023 Multicultural Carnival saw the highest number of teams participate to date, with 93 teams attending from 26 different schools. This was an increase from 88 teams competing in 2022. This year also saw the inclusion of a standalone year 11/12 division, which allowed the participation of senior school students prior to exams and finishing their schooling. It had 7 teams competing in this, previously there has just been a year 9/10/11 division.

Schools commented on the inclusive and welcoming environment of the day, and the ability to allow students to be involved and play netball who may not ordinarily play the sport at an association level.

There was interest again in including boys high school divisions, however not enough teams were nominated to allow for a small round robin. NWA is hopeful with the success of the Junior Thunder League pilot program, and the growing interest in boys and men's netball, there will be enough schools nominating boy's team in future to be able to run these divisions.

Although primarily a participation carnival, a trophy is awarded to the team at the top of the ladder for each division at the end of the day. Year 5/6 Blue District Darlings




