The Gold Industry Group WA Netball League is set for another mammoth year in 2025, with all eyes on the Western Roar after their upmost dominance in 2024. All eight teams will be gunning to topple the status quo and see themselves at the top of the ladder come July.

Comets

The 2024 runners up, who have undergone a name change for the 2025 season to be known solely as the Comets, and will no doubt be looking for redemption this season.

The return of Mia Henderson and Sloan Burton, alongside the elevation of Kianah Davey from the Sharks 21/U side will mix up the keenly talented squad. There was no rivalry as great as the Comets and Western Roar last season, expect the Comets to come out of the gate swinging, looking to lift that trophy they held in 2023.

Fremantle Sharks

After losing out on that coveted grand final spot in 2024, the Fremantle Sharks are focusing on “handling the hard” this season.

The loss of defender Ruth Aryang to the West Coast Fever and shooter Georgie Cleaver, have left room for some exciting recruits who will add plenty of depth to the squad. The Sharks are aiming to go that one step further in 2025 by handling the hard and thriving under pressure.

Peel Lightning

With seven new players in the squad, Peel have been working hard in the off season to gel and improve as a team.

Looking to crack finals this year, Peel want to showcase just how competitive they can be. Keep an eye out in Round One when they don their new dress design for the first time!

Rangers

The Rangers enter 2025 with six of their 10 players being new to the squad and have been eagerly working on their connection in pre-season.

The side may be without their star shooter Georgia Pitt this year, but the young squad have a variation of talent, including state team athletes and New South Wales import Olivia Doyle.



Southside Demons

Undoubtedly one of the biggest shake ups of the season, the Demons have a mixture of new recruits, elevated and returning athletes.

The team hit the ground running early this year, focusing on their culture, efficiency and building on their momentum from last season. With plenty of fresh players, the squad are also balanced out by experienced Demons athletes like Club Captain Meg Gallagher and Open Captain Chanel Gomes.

Souwest Jets

The Souwest Jets are looking to move up the ladder this year, utilising some of the strengths of their new players to make a clear impact on the competition.

The country-based club will be leaning on their roots in the South-West as they introduce new players into the fold. New Zealand athlete Meretini Fuimaono and Queensland player Maddie Grant join the squad, as well as some elevations and new recruits.

West Coast Warriors

The Warriors have made some impressive pick-ups in the off season, including Scarlet Jauncey, who now joins her sister Jamaica in the purple. Former Queensland Firebird Beryl Friday has joined the League and will co-captain with Scarlet.

Despite plenty of change for the Warriors this season, they will be looking to use their diversity and change as an asset this year.

Western Roar

There is no other way to describe the Western Roar in 2025 than having a target on their backs. After taking home the premierships in all three divisions, including going undefeated in the Open Division, their spot on the top of the ladder will be highly sought after.

The Open team will not be looking to mix up their strategy too much this year, hoping to repeat their success again in 2025.

Comets coming for that trophy

The Comets, formerly known as the Hamersley Comets, will be looking to take back that trophy they narrowly missed out on last year.

Head Coach Michelle Cox said the 2023 premiers have been using last year's result as a challenge they must overcome.

"The focus for us this year is to get to the grand final again and then to win that trophy, to go that one little step further," she said.

"We want to continue to build this year, so we hit our peak at the right time."

The Comets have a fresh look this year, welcoming back some returning players into the fold.

Sloan Burton returns from a year with Team Bath in the UK and brings her experience from the West Coast Fever training environment to the Comets. The team also welcome back their 2023 "Heart of Gold" Club Person of the year, Mia Henderson after a year off.

"We've got a bit of a different squad this year, so it will be really interesting to see

how we have built," Cox said.

"The squad are gelling really well, for our returning players it's great to see some of the skills they've brought back, and our new players bring a fresh element to the side."

The team have been working hard in the offseason, prioritising their versatility.

"Pre-season has been fantastic, the girls have come to the sessions with a high level of fitness," Cox said.

"Majority of our players can play two if not three positions really well, so as coaches that gives us the ability to change up our starting seven every week and not be predictable."

With so many changes to team lists in 2025, Cox is aware that no team will be the same as last season, and the importance of every individual game.

"Everyone's very different, there have been so many changes that we're just excited to get out there and test ourselves against the competition."



Player To Watch - Clara Wigley

Watch out for Clara Wigley, Cox describes her as an up-and-coming player who will go places very soon. Wigley was named the 17/U State Team MVP last year and has been selected in the 19/U squad for

2025. She has also spent time in the Fever training environment recently and will no doubt bring a new set of skills to this season.

Sharks are handling the hard

The Fremantle Sharks will be keenly focused on “handling the hard better” in 2025, finding success in those tough moments.

In 2024, the side found themselves in a high number of close games, often winning or losing by a small margin.

Head Coach Melanie Rainey said in those close games last year the squad never gave up.

“That’s the mentality that we have, we never back down. This ties into our motivation for this year, which is handling the hard better,” she said.

The squad have been working hard in pre-season including those athletes involved in other high-performance environments.

“We have had a number of athletes involved with West Coast Fever or Academy, so we’ve had a focus on smaller group sessions until the whole squad reunited in February,” Rainey said.

Much of the Sharks’ talent has been nurtured through different Netball WA pathways and rewarded with the ability to train in a Suncorp Super Netball environment with the West Coast Fever.

“The depth of the competition is growing year after year, and that’s a testament to Netball WA’s commitment to the Fever in Time Program and growing the younger age groups who push through to Futures and League,” Rainey said

The Sharks have lost some huge talent in the off season, including the retirement of Larrissa Harrison, Ruth Aryang who joins the West Coast Fever as a contracted player and Georgie Cleaver who is focusing on her AFLW career.

Rainey said despite the athletes being great for the team, the whole squad are excited for the girls to take on these opportunities and they have plenty of new talent.

“Gaining the experience of Numi Tupaea back in that wing attack role really consolidates and solidifies our attack end,” Rainey said.

Kasey Ridout joins from Peel Lightning, bringing skill in the shooting end. Kathryn Byrne comes over from the Rangers and Jessica Killick returns to the competition. They have also elevated Ava Robson from the 21/U side after a stellar last season.

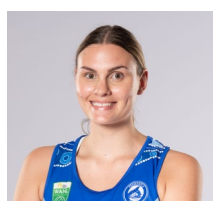


Player To Watch - Sophie Eastaugh

Connection is crucial for the Rangers in 2025, with six new players on their list entering the season.

With so many new players, the team have a variation of talent, including past and present state players.

Head Coach Taryn Barley said the new variations will be a big asset to the squad this year.

After finishing fifth on the ladder in 2024, and narrowly missing their chance at finals, Rangers have been working hard in the off season, hoping to go that one step further this year.

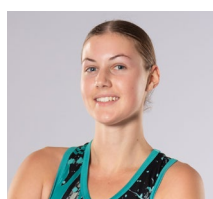


Player To Watch **Tayla Styles**

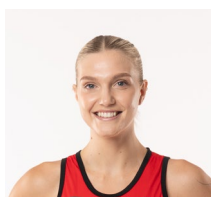


Player To Watch - Hayley Evans

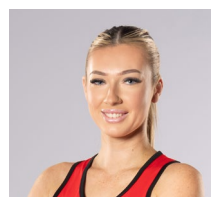

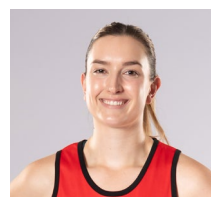

The Jets hope to prove themselves as fierce competitors this year and will be looking to their new players and levels of versatility to do so.

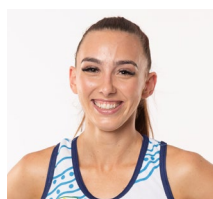


Player To Watch - Meretini Fuimaono
