PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Our Centenary Year has been one of incredible growth for Netball in Western Australia, once again cementing Netball WA and West Coast Fever as industry leaders.

For the first time in five years and with the assistance of the State Government, Netball WA and Netball Australia were able to bring back an International Test Match to RAC Arena, hosting the third game of the Constellation Cup against the New Zealand Silver Ferns. Although the result was not in favour of the Origin Australian Diamonds, the 13,048 fans who flooded RAC Arena demonstrated WA's capacity to host such important matches and also showed how passionate and invested WA Netball fans are.

On behalf of Netball WA and West Coast Fever, I would like to acknowledge the State Government and Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries for their assistance in securing the Test Match as part of our Centenary celebrations as well as their ongoing support of our sport in WA from the grassroots to the elite level.

Such support is crucial to the success of West Coast Fever in the Suncorp Super Netball League, and our community and inclusion teams throughout the State. In particular, the support of the outgoing Minister for Sport and Recreation, Honourable David Templeman MLA. His passionate support has been enormous for the game of Netball and West Coast Fever in particular. As an organisation, we're grateful for your motivational talks in the Green Room before a game, your loud cheers from the stands and your ability to encapsulate in your speeches the significance of Netball WA and West Coast Fever's impact on sport during our Centenary celebrations.

Another highlight for 2024 was the renewal of our partnership with the Gold Industry Group. GIG have been part of the Netball WA family since 2018 and we are very excited to have them continue as part of our sport as Principal Partner of Netball WA and Joint Principal Partner of West Coast Fever.

I want to thank the outgoing Chair of GIG, Kelly Carter, for her amazing support of Netball and Fever throughout her time as Chair of, and board member of, GIG.

Throughout the last year, the Netball WA Board has enjoyed a closer working relationship with the Board of Glass Jar Australia. This collaboration has benefited both organisations and the broader Netball ecosystem.

I have no doubt that the work the Board has done in 2024 will ready our organisation for the further changes and growth we will face in the coming years.

The Board conducted a comprehensive review of all governance documents and strategic policies in 2024, including the Rules of Association. This process has resulted in a more contemporary and best-practice-aligned approach to governance.

We have also continued to review the NWA Strategic Plan 2023-2025 to ensure its ongoing relevance to the organisation's purpose, while relevant preparations are underway for a new plan to be signed off for implementation from 2026.

Looking ahead to 2025, the State and Federal elections will occupy our attention as we seek to ensure that Netball is strongly considered when it comes to election commitments and promises, in particular around facilities right across the State.

I want to thank the Directors of our Board for their commitment to Netball WA and West Coast Fever.

In 2024, we welcomed Warren Fish and Maria May to the Board. Warren is the Director of Communities, Environment and Government for Fortescue and brings his expertise in government and stakeholder relations. He also has experience in heritage, native title and Indigenous affairs and has been appointed as Director for a two-year term in August 2024. While Maria, former Netball Australia Chief Financial Officer, brings her accounting and commercial expertise and has been appointed to fill a casual vacancy until the 2025 Annual General Meeting.

At our Annual General Meeting, Patricia Robinson, Glenda Kickett and Nadia Mitsopoulos, were all duly elected to the Board by the members, with their terms commencing at the AGM and remaining for a further three years. While Natasha Aristei continues to serve as an elected director, bringing her community Netball experience to our Board.

Additionally, Dana Sawka and Skye Miller were also both re-appointed for a further term.

We wish Lisa Wynne, who resigned from her position as Elected Director at the 2024 Annual General Meeting, well on her future endeavours.

Lastly, I would like to extend my thanks to our Group Chief Executive Officer Simone Hansen, the Executive Team and the entire Netball WA and West Coast Fever staff, whose achievements in 2025 were once again impressive and indicative of the future success to come.

Once again, 2024 was a huge year for Netball in Western Australia, producing exceptional results on and off the court. From the grassroots to the elite level, goals were set and achieved throughout the State.

In 2024, Netball WA celebrated our Centenary and what an amazing year it turned out to be to mark this significant occasion.

We celebrated our 100 years of history throughout the year including the launch of our book: Netball's Century in the West: 100 years of Passion and Success. We also had the superb installation at the Fuel To Go & Play Association Championships titled History Lane. The installation allowed people to take a walk down memory lane and learn about the trailblazers who have made the sport what it is today.

In such a noteworthy year, Netball WA developed a new Strategic Facilities Plan which will guide the planning and investment in new developments and resurfacing of Netball facilities for the next decade.

The plan has two core focuses: the upgrade and maintenance of our current facilities; and new facilities to be built. This plan was created in conjunction with more than 67 Netball Associations and 533 Clubs who deliver our sport, week-in, week-out.

With a State Election due in March 2025 and a Federal Election also expected in the first half of the year, the Strategic Facilities Plan will help us to inform all sides of politics, as well as Local Governments to ensure Netball is front of mind and successful in obtaining funding commitments in the lead up to the elections.

West Coast Fever had an outstanding season that was capped off with a sixth consecutive finals appearance. The squad shocked the League by starting the 2024 Suncorp Super Netball season with six straight wins, after signing six new players with a reduced pre-season period.

Fever ultimately fell short by one goal in the Preliminary Final to the Melbourne Vixens, but what we were able to achieve in 2024 was sensational.

Off the court, the club broke our own regular season home game record three times. This culminated in 11,841 fans attending the Round 14 match against the Melbourne Mavericks, another Suncorp Super Netball record for West Coast Fever.

With a total number of more than 51,565 Primary registered playing members in 2024, Netball once again reaffirmed itself as the number one female participation sport in Western Australia.



The Fuel To Go & Play Association Championships saw more than 4,200 participants, while the Boorloo NAIDOC Carnival attracted over 850 attendees, and the Perth Multicultural Carnival set a record with 1,500 participants.

On a representative level, Netball WA sent teams to the National Netball Championships (NNC), Marie Little Shield and the Inaugural First Nations Tournament. WA were the only team to take home two medals at the NNC with the 17/U squad winning silver and 19/U achieving bronze.

Our Gold Industry Group WA Netball League also went from strength-to-strength in 2024, with the Men's competition expanding from four to five teams and Western Roar once again demonstrating their dominance, claiming the premiership in all three divisions.

Glass Jar Australia's Shooting Stars program continues to play a major role in ensuring young Aboriginal girls have great opportunities to complete their high school education and netball is privileged to play a key role.

2024 was another huge year for Shooting Stars as the program empowered more than 1,000 girls and women across 22 sites. Shooting Stars also conducted their biggest Senior Leadership Camp yet, with 38 Year 10-12 students attending the camp in Perth from across all Shooting Stars sites.

It was a significant disappointment for Netball in our State when the WA Institute of Sport decided to end its Netball program after a 40-year long relationship. At the time of writing this report, we are working towards how we can fill this gap when the program officially ends in May 2025. However, we are positive the future of Netball development is bright, and we remain committed to supporting, nurturing and developing WA athletes to reach their dreams at the elite level.

2024 concluded with a history making deal when Netball WA renewed our longstanding partnership with Australia's peak gold mining body, the Gold Industry Group. The renewal is GIG's highest ever commitment

to female sport, with the new three-year partnership totalling more than \$6 million.

The Gold Industry Group will continue as the Principal Partner of Netball WA, have secured Joint Principal Partner of West Coast Fever in 2025 and will continue as naming rights partner to the GIG WA Netball League.

In 2024, we lost a very special member of our Netball WA community, Liz Booth. Liz has left an indelible mark on Netball in this State as a player, coach, administrator, and mentor to many. Thousands showed their respect for Liz at her funeral held at Gold Netball Centre, a testament to the impact she made on our community. Her passion, commitment, dedication and enthusiasm for Netball is unrivalled and her legacy will continue for decades to come.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our Principal, Elite and Major Partners of Netball WA and West Coast Fever for their ongoing support of Netball in WA. Your support is essential to our success on and off the court. We are grateful for all that you have done in 2024 and are incredibly excited to see what we can achieve together in 2025.

And to our incredibly hardworking Netball WA, West Coast Fever and Glass Jar Australia staff and volunteers, who in their determined and diligent efforts guarantee our game can operate week after week from grassroots to the elite level, thank you.

To our Executive Team of Sue Gaudion, Stu Gilsenan, Beth Harvey and Helen Ockerby, thank you for all you do in ensuring Netball in our Centenary year and the business operates to the best of its ability.

Lastly, to our Board of Directors, especially our President, Craig Heatley for your continuous support. Netball in WA would not have had the sensational year it has without your guidance.

GENERAL MANAGER REPORT

COMMUNITY

2024 marked 100 years of Netball WA and witnessed some sensational celebrations of our sport's Centenary undertaken across our community.

I wish to extend my gratitude to our Netball WA History and Heritage staff and volunteers as well as our Awards and Recognition Committee members who spent eight years planning and preparing for the events during our Centenary year. There are too many people to thank individually, but the work of Life Members Helen Robinson and Elisma Merillo must be commended. Both women tirelessly gave their time to assist with the archives and preparation of the history book "Netball's Century in the West: 100 years of Passion and Success".

Community Netball has gone from strength to strength in 2024, with participation growth across the board. A special thanks to the commitment and passion of our vast number of volunteers. We would not be able to successfully develop the 51,565 primary registered playing members who participated in Netball in 2024 without the work of the 67 Metropolitan and Regional Associations and the 533 Clubs who provided competitions and programs.

In 2024, the primary registered members increased by 4.2 per cent from 2023 and saw consistent growth across the State in junior and senior categories. Non-playing registered members grew significantly in 2024, up 32 per cent to a total of 14,360 umpires, coaches, bench officials and committee members. As a sport,

our future is strong and sustainable whilst we have such passionate engagement from the volunteer workforce. Netball WA is indebted to the volunteers who coordinate on the ground week in and week out for the players.

With our Centenary as the focus, the Fuel to Go and Play Association Championships were once again a thrilling display of Netball talent over the WA Day long weekend. The enduring legacy and achievements of Netball were honoured with a walkthrough exhibition titled "History Lane". More than 2,500 spectators took the opportunity alongside the athletes to browse the display and soak up the stories of those who came before them. The carnival saw an expansion of 16 invitational teams from Singapore and 14 No Limits teams, as well as a wonderful display of talent in the Boy's Division.

Community Netball continued to defend and extend participation in 2024. Our schools' programs gained further momentum, we achieved a 14 per cent increase in male participation, a 25 per cent increase in Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander players and an uplift in No Limits participants.

The Community Netball Department are pleased to present the achievements made in 2024 and are confident we will continue to reach further goals in 2025.

In 2024, a total of 67 Associations were affiliated to Netball WA including 21 Tier 1 Associations, 11 Tier 2 Associations, 33 Tier 3 Associations, and two Associate Members. We exceeded the KPI with 51,565 primary registered members playing in Winter and Spring competitions.

Government funding secured to assist and fund new and refurbished places to play.

With the 2024-2034 Netball WA Strategic Facilities Plan finalised and presented to stakeholders in September, it was an opportune time to meet with local, State and Federal Government representatives to highlight the urgent needs of Netball facilities around the State. Upgrades and improvements to facilities remains the most challenging area for Community and Competition Netball in WA at present. Having the plan finished enables Netball WA to continue lobbying and advocating for our Associations and members who utilise these spaces on a regular basis.

Our Strategic Facilities Plan has two core focus areas; the upgrade and maintenance of our current facilities; and where our sport has identified, new facilities need to be built.

The plan was developed in conjunction with our Netball Associations and Clubs who deliver our sport weekly throughout each year. Using the first-hand information provided by our grassroots volunteers combined with a scientific approach, looking at population growth and netball demand, we were able to develop a detailed analysis of what is required so everyone is able to play and participate in Netball in WA.

This plan provides the framework to assist all levels of government as to where their investment in Netball needs to be directed from 2024 to 2034. It is

tremendous to see the interest in Netball continue to grow and Netball WA will continue to work with Local, State and Federal Governments, along with private enterprises, to secure the investment we need to ensure we have the facilities to continue to grow our sport.

Netball WA would like to thank the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries for its continued support of Netball right across the State, as well as its assistance in the development of this plan.

It was exciting to see facility upgrades commencing or completed in 2024 at Wanneroo Districts Netball Association, Perth Netball Association, Kojonup Netball Association, Southern Districts Netball Association, Bunbury Netball Association, Kalamunda & Districts Netball Association and Swan Districts Netball Association.

In addition, Netball WA is working closely with the City of Wanneroo and City of Swan local governments who have recently opened courts at sites in Butler and Dayton respectively. Woolworths NetSetGo (WWNSG) Come and Try sessions were held in December 2024 to garner interest and engagement from the local communities to implement WWNSG Independent Centres at these sites in 2025. With other Metropolitan Associations land locked, this is a positive growth strategy for Netball in these corridors.

10% increase in registered numbers of boys / men.

Male participation in Netball is increasing with many boys' keen to continue their development pathway after turning 13 years of age. As per the National Junior Sports Policy, once boys reach this age they must move out of the female-based competitions. Our Metropolitan and Regional Associations are working towards accommodating boys in their competitions by offering mixed or boys-only competitions once they age out of the 12 Under division. Netball WA are continuing to support growing male participation by working with key stakeholders and advocating with the establishment of Netball WA Boys & Men's Advisory Group.

Male participation has continued to grow, with registrations increasing by 14 per cent from 2023 to 2024. The introduction of Hubs in the latter of 2024 assisted boys from 13 years onwards to continue their development, an initiative that will flow into 2025.

2024 culminated with a Netball clinic that saw over 60 boys participate and showcased the amazing talent in this cohort, working with Netball WA coaches and male role models from West Coast Men's & Mixed Netball Association.

Netball WA was pleased to record an increase of 25 per cent in the participation rate of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander players registered in primary and secondary competitions in 2024. A total of 4,769 players in this cohort were involved in Netball programs and pathways during the Winter and Spring seasons.

No Limits Netball Program

No Limits programs were conducted across 12 Associations during 2024, with 401 participants involved, an uplift of 121 players from the previous year.

Walking Netball

In 2024, there were 10 Walking Netball programs conducted in Metropolitan and Regional Associations, offering the opportunity to those wanting to enter or re-engage with our fantastic sport. Three hundred participants engaged in Walking Netball throughout 2024, with Noranda Netball Association leading the way in this space.

Off the back of six changes to the contracted team from 2023, West Coast Fever had another successful season and defied the odds to make their fifth consecutive finals appearance. With the conclusion of the 2024 season, the West Coast Fever have made six finals appearances in seven years.

The Club saw a new captain lead the team with Jess Anstiss voted in by her peers, joined by Jhaniele Fowler-Nembhard and Alice Teague-Neeld as vice captains. The Club welcomed aboard Shanice Beckford (debut), Olivia Wilkinson (debut), Jordan Cransberg (elevated Training Partner), Fran Williams (debut), Kadie-Ann Dehaney (Sunshine Coast Lightning) and Kelsey Browne (Collingwood Magpies). Ruth Aryang was the Club's inaugural 11th player, making her debut alongside sister Sunday Aryang in Round Five against the Queensland Firebirds.

Additionally, the Club welcomed a new assistant coach, Sara Francis-Bayman, new lead physiotherapist Phoebe Adams and Performance Analyst Liam Beazleigh. Despite the wholesale changes, players and staff built a thriving team culture and environment that brought out the best in everyone, demonstrating the strength of the high performance systems and people within the club.

After setting the standard with six straight wins to open the season, Fever was once again a benchmark team. The team won 11 of their 14 matches and ended the regular season in equal first place, joining the Adelaide Thunderbirds and Melbourne Vixens on 40 points. Only percentage separated the teams with Fever finishing third by the smallest of margins. In the Minor Semi-Final, Fever defeated the Lightning by ten points before going down by one goal to the Vixens in the preliminary final.

Five athletes went on to play international Netball for their respective countries in 2024: Sunday Aryang (Origin Australia Diamonds), Jhaniele Fowler-Nembhard (captain of Jamaica), Shanice Beckford and Kadie Ann Dehaney (Jamaica) and Fran Williams (captain of England). Alice Teague-Neeld was a Diamonds squad invitee whilst Olivia Wilkinson and Ruth Aryang travelled to Fiji as part of the Australian U21 team in preparation for the 2025 World Youth Cup.

Additionally, we continued to champion diversity within our club, embracing the State's best male athletes, with our four male Training Partners elevating our training environment for another year. We extended our male training program into the Suncorp Super Netball Reserves program to broaden the talent pool and help drive the next layer of talent within the WCFNC pathway.

2024 was another highly successful year for athletes throughout the Netball WA Pathway. In April at the National Netball Championship, both teams were able to achieve a spot in the finals. The 17/U WA team finished with a silver medal and the 19/U WA team secured a bronze medal. From this tournament, we had 11 athletes identified and invited to Australian underage camps in July.

In 2024, Netball Australia piloted a new competition to support the Suncorp Super Netball franchises and their underpinning athletes. Super Netball Reserves provided an opportunity for West Coast Fever to field a team to compete against the other SSN Clubs. West Coast Fever Reserves won five of the six matches with no finals contested in the pilot year. The unofficial ladder saw West Coast Fever Reserves finish on top.

WA was well represented in the 21/U Australian Squad in 2024. With five Western Australian athletes plus West Coast Fever athlete Olivia Wilkinson selected to participate in the U/21 Rising Star Tour in Fiji as they prepare for the 2025 World Youth Cup.

Netball Australia launched the inaugural First Nations National Netball Team, The Black Swans. The program saw selected athletes participate at the Pacific Aus Series in February 2024 and the Australian Netball Championships in August 2024. WA was represented by two athletes, Scarlet and Jamaica Jauncey.

In another first, Netball Australia launched the inaugural

First Nations Nationals held in Melbourne over a four-day event in September. Head Coach and former West Coast Fever athlete Josie Janz-Dawson lead the team to the fifth and sixth play off on the final day, eventually going down to Tasmania by two goals.

In 2024, there was a strong emphasis on professional growth and skill development for both coaches and umpires, with numerous learning opportunities designed to expand their expertise. Key highlights included hosting our Peer Network webinars and invitations to WCF Reserves games and Diamond training sessions for WANL coaches.

Entering its third year, the Fever in Time program saw more than 200 athletes from across WA training and competing at the Gold Netball Centre under the guidance of 51 Fever in Time coaches. The program also provided a unique opportunity for 33 umpires to develop their skills and techniques during high-level match play alongside players and coaches.

To conclude an exceptional year, we are excited to celebrate the selection of seven West Australian umpires for Netball Australia's performance umpiring squads for 2025. Additionally, we are proud to have strong representation from our bench officials at the Elite level. This accomplishment marks a significant milestone in the development of State technical officials, with WA now proudly represented across all levels of the Netball Australia pathway.

The Gold Industry Group Western Australian Netball League (GIG WANL) Competition continued to thrive as a platform to delivering talent in all facets of the game. GIG WANL provides a vital stepping stone for athletes, coaches, umpires and bench officials to hone their skills. Many have gone on to take the next step within the pathway including; National Netball Championships, First Nations Nationals, Super Netball Reserves and Suncorp Super Netball competitions.

Broadcast production partner Brightside Live delivered quality content to view throughout the season, and Streamer came on board as the new streaming platform in partnership with The West Australian. In February, Netball WA launched dedicated social media accounts for GIG WANL on Facebook and Instagram, which generated positive engagement rates.

GIG WANL took to the regions with the Souwest Jets, Peel Lightning and Rangers hosting home games during the regular season, held at venues in Eaton, Waroona, Mundaring and Mandurah. The competition continues to promote and drive awareness through theme rounds at the Gold Netball Centre, such as Gold Industry Group, Belt up and First Nations rounds. A highlight of the 2024 season was when Lindal Rohde reached her 250-game milestone and the entire playing and coaching cohort in the venue stopped to join the guard of honor to celebrate this amazing achievement.

The Grand Finals were fiercely contested, with Western Roar taking out the premiership in all three divisions. The Open side won the GIG WANL premiership by one goal against the Hamersley Comets. The 21/U team, having a solid win against the Southside Demons and the Western Roar Men, continued their domination with a win over Hamersley Comets.

The final event of the year saw Caitlyn Brown crowned the Jill McIntosh Medal winner. Brown joins a select group of five athletes who have won the Jill McIntosh medal on two occasions.

The Commercial, Media, Marketing & Events Department are responsible for leveraging the success of Netball to the West Coast Fever and Netball WA brands with a strong consumer revenue and commercial base, contributing 41 per cent of the organisation's total consolidated revenues.

The Commercial Team ensures the delivery of partnerships with our valued sponsors and corporate partners and the expansion of our retail footprint across the organisation. They also manage the operational delivery and customer servicing of the West Coast Fever membership and ticketing programs including all associated activities.

With expertise and intent, the Media and Communications Team constructs the organisation's narrative that is then delivered through engaging

content across our own organic platforms and the wider traditional media.

The Marketing and Events Team develops influential campaigns that push our organisation ahead of the rest, developing an incredibly strong bond with our members that finds its roots in our organisation's values. As well as this, the Team deliver the best Suncorp Super Netball game day experience in the land. All occasions big or small are an unforgettable experience, ensuring attendees truly feel a part of a community.

These teams consistently push our organisation to bigger and better things and will continue to cement Netball WA and West Coast Fever as leaders in West Australian sport.

2024 was once again a year of growth and retention with our sponsors and corporate partners across the organisation.

Q4 saw a history making deal with Netball WA renewing its longstanding partnership with Australia's peak gold mining body, the Gold Industry Group. Commencing in January 2025. The renewal is GIG's highest ever contribution to female sport, with the new three-year commitment totalling more than \$6 million across all streams of the business.

The partnership more than doubles the investment GIG already makes to Netball WA, Fever and Glass Jar Australia and will see them continue as Principal Partner of Netball WA and secured them joint Principal Partner of West Coast Fever.

Alongside this, Hyundai came on board in 2024 as a Partner for Netball WA and West Coast Fever and many valued partnerships were renewed.

Such renewals include Healthway promoting the Livelighter message, Linley Valley Pork, New Balance, Gilbert, the Insurance Commission of WA promoting the Belt Up message, Brightside Live and SKG Radiology.

Our retail offerings have continued to optimise our revenue potential through match day purchases, online or in store. The introduction of two retail outlets at RAC Arena increased our average game day sales by 12 per cent from 2023 to 2024. Association visits strengthened the bond between players and the fans and allowed further opportunity to purchase merchandise. Across all sales channels, merchandise revenues increased 39 per cent YOY.

The desire to be a West Coast Fever member, and therefore a part of the Green Army was higher than ever in 2024. The club saw an 18.5 per cent increase in paid Memberships from 2023, with 4034 total paid memberships for the year.

West Coast Fever and Netball WA Social Media channels all experienced an increase in followers and engagement, alongside the introduction of a Gold Industry Group WA Netball League specific account on Instagram and Facebook.

Fever's Instagram followers grew by 25 per cent with a 58 per cent increase in engagement, whilst our Facebook followers grew by 45 per cent. Our Tiktok audience skyrocketed as we more than doubled our following to equal a cross-channel total of 31.1 million impressions.

Netball WA also reached new heights, our cross-channel fans grew by 71 per cent, alongside a 22 per cent growth in our engagement rate and 4.58 million impressions.

Such increases in our Social Media channels are a direct correlation to our innovative digital content that strengthens our brand and the passion of our fans both during the SSN season and out.

From an Earned Media perspective, Fever's mentions in traditional media increased by 23 per cent with a strong print performance and a 79 per cent increase in print mentions.

The new GIG WANL channels allowed for growth in a much more specific space, promoting the State League and allowing for more content to be created. With cross channel post impressions totalling 913,000 and an average engagement rate of 12.97 per cent, the goal of growing the channels was certainly achieved.

Our GIG WANL broadcast was carried out by Seven West Media's Streamer platform, allowing matches to be viewed live and free. We are pleased that this relationship will continue into 2025, allowing the game to grow.

Throughout 2024 we continued to review and adjust our data strategy which has resulted in the onboarding of a new Customer Data Platform in December 2024.

A key focus for 2025 will be the leveraging of our first party data sources into one program to allow us to continue to grow membership, participation and commercial revenues.

The Marketing team completed a Masterbrand Strategy in 2024, designed to develop clear brand positioning, values and messaging for Netball WA, West Coast Fever and Shooting Stars for both internal and external stakeholders.





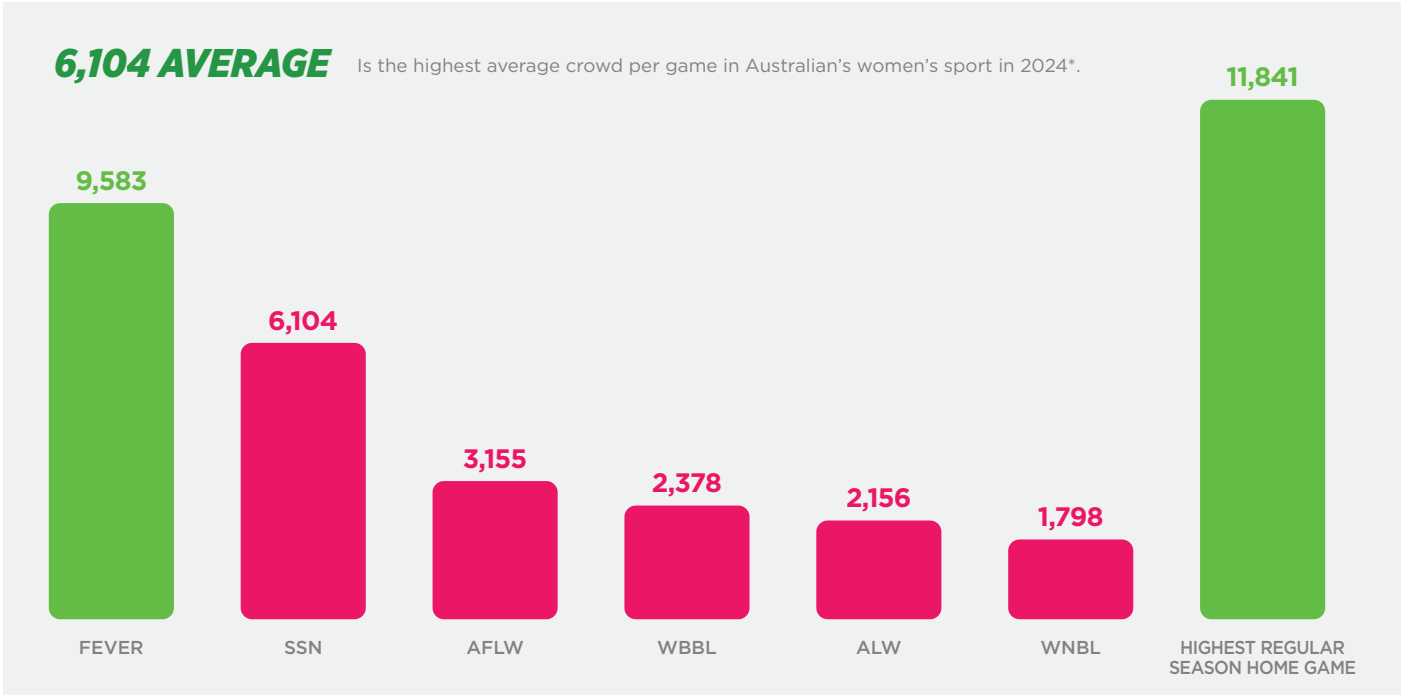
Our Marketing Team also executed a “Take your Team” campaign which resulted in more than 7,000 netballers attending Fever games in 2024 with their team, accounting for 18 per cent of ticket sales.

The “See you on the Court” campaign continues to build brand equity, participation growth and retention with a five per cent increase across junior, senior and Woolwoths NetSetGo participation.

West Coast Fever home game tickets were also incredibly sought after, the Club had an average attendance of 9,583 fans compared to that of the 6,104 League average, a 36 per cent difference.

Such a high average was achieved through the Club breaking both the League and our own game day attendance record three times in the season, culminating in a crowd of 11,841 fans during Round 14 against the Melbourne Mavericks.

Our CMME department, led by the Events, Membership and Ticketing Teams worked tirelessly to achieve such records and create an unforgettable game day experience.



It’s not just game day when our Events team shines, the Netball WA and West Coast Fever 2024 calendar was full and saw the team deliver 21 events.

The CMME Department will continue to grow in 2025, being both leaders of commercial operations within SSN and wider West Australian sport.

GOLD NETBALL CENTRE REPORT

The Gold Netball Centre built on its incredibly successful year in 2023, achieving record court hire numbers again in 2024. Notable growth was seen in Netball WA's use of the venue, with the introduction of the WANL Futures competition and an increased demand for courts to accommodate the Fever in Time program.

Community Netball hours also rose due to GIG WANL Club training requirements, while pickleball continued to expand both during and outside of the Netball season, particularly during off-peak times. The growing demand for Netball courts did see a slight decline in volleyball usage across the year.

The venue remained committed to providing excellent service to its hirers and users, achieving a 91 per cent overall satisfaction rating in the VenuesWest customer satisfaction survey, up two per cent. Centre staff extend their appreciation to the organisations and individuals who supported the facility throughout the year and look forward to another successful year in 2025.

Department of Local Government Sport & Cultural Industries Executive Director Sport and Recreation, Marcelyn Nicolaou. As well as Healthway Executive Director Joanne Graham Smith, Gold Industry Group Directors Julie Jones & Wayne Bramwell, Anglo Gold Senior Vice President Stephen Perkins, Hyundai WA Regional Manager Michael Beros and Netball WA Life Members, Associations Presidents, the Netball WA Board and Executive Team.

It was pleasing to see the No Limits Division grow from two to three Divisions in 2024.

MEASURE OF SUCCESS

10% increase in the number of participants engaged in school programs.

After a very successful refresh in 2023, the schools program gained further momentum in 2024 with 36,146 students participating in all the Netball offerings provided in both primary and secondary schools throughout the State. This was a 12 per cent increase on the previous year's school engagement, which is a direct reflection on the work implemented by the Participation Team. The Netball WA Teacher Ambassador program grew exponentially in 2024 to 250 teachers with them receiving professional development and support prior to the school year commencing.

The Netball WA Schools Engagement Strategy has been developed and provides a focus for the Participation Team and Regional Staff to continue to grow and develop this important pipeline for transition to Community Netball across the State.

School participation numbers for 2024 are highlighted below:

- SchoolNet: 61 SchoolNet Programs conducted with 1,482 primary and secondary school students.
- West Coast Fever Cup Competitions throughout Metropolitan and Regional areas: 34 WCF Cups reaching 8,002 school participants.
- After School Clinics: 46 After School Programs conducted with 293 participants engaged.
- Sporting Schools: 84 Coach delivered Programs, delivered by Netball WA Community Coaches and 44 Teacher delivered programs to a total of 15,742 school children.

In 2024, a total of 15 Specialist Schools were endorsed by Netball WA. This included eight Tier 1 schools and seven Tier 2 schools, with 1,191 students involved. The Inaugural Specialist Schools WCF Cup was held on '23 October with a fantastic turnout of 67 teams from the 15 Specialist Schools participating.

Aboriginal Grassroots Program

In 2024, we conducted an evaluation of the Grassroots program. This was undertaken by consulting with each of the eight current sites and getting their feedback on the program from previous years. Once the evaluation was concluded, it was determined that Netball WA will focus on building stronger relationships between the Grassroot Site and their local Association, encouraging emerging leaders by hosting a leadership camp in July for those selected, training and upskilling in both coaching and umpiring as well as on court sessions to assist coaches.

The benefits of the Grassroots program cannot be underestimated, and Netball WA looks forward to growing this program even further in the years to come.

Aboriginal Development Academy

2024 was a year of consolidation for the Aboriginal Development Academy, following on from the updated program implemented in 2023. The programs wholistic approach with on court and off court elements provided the 17 participants an introduction to the Netball pathway and creates the foundations for strong and confident future netballers.

The off-court sessions focussed on nutrition, rolling for recovery, goal setting and reflection. On court sessions were presented by a variety of Netball WA qualified coaches including two Aboriginal coaches and provided different skill development opportunities week to week for six weeks. The program culminated in a Hub Day where the Academy squad gained valuable match play against the Southern Districts Djinda's and Mandurah Grassroot site teams.

With the introduction of the First Nations Tournament by Netball Australia in 2024, an important alternative pathway for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander girls and young women has been opened which provides a clear stepping stone for this Development Academy in the future.

Inclusive Participation Grants Program

Netball WA commenced the Inclusive Participation Program funded generously by the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) after securing a staff member based in the Southwest early in the year. In addition to a new annual NAIDOC Carnival hosted in Katanning in 2024, the program has opened opportunities for young Aboriginal women and girls to participate in Netball as a player or umpire in the first year of the program.

The funding is being used to set up programs to break down the barriers that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people face in trying to both play and be involved in Netball, and in turn increasing participation rates in the sport.

Most notably, Busselton Senior High School Stars Foundation students from years seven, eight and nine played their first ever game of Netball in October 2024 at Busselton Netball Association in the Spring Netball Competition. These girls participated in a school Netball program during term three, funded by Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC). Most of the students had never played Netball before but were eager to learn and participate.

Creating a culturally supportive and safe environment allowed these girls to learn how to play and work as a team, gaining confidence and self-esteem. Plenty of running, jumping, agility and coordination also ensured the players were well prepared for their first season.

Finally, a new culturally appropriate resource specifically tailored to modified aged participants (five to 10-year-olds) has been developed and published as an option to provide additional methods of engagement within the community. Named Danjoo Waabiny, the Activity Booklet will provide young Aboriginal children interested in Netball the ability to engage with the sport in a culturally supportive manner.

Walking Netball

Walking Netball is a modified version of Netball with a few adjustments to the traditional rules. It is a low impact version of the sport that emphasises injury reduction so anyone, no matter their age or physical capabilities, can participate. Walking Netball encourages adults to have a more gradual introduction or re-introduction to netball and physical activity by regaining basic motor skills, and encouraging balance, coordination, and better footwork. However, most importantly, Walking Netball provides an opportunity for participants to have fun, meet with friends and develop social networks.

No Limits and Marie Little Shield

The Netball WA No Limits Netball Program is a participation-based program for individuals that have an intellectual disability. No Limits Netball Program sites (12 Associations in 2024) deliver weekly training programs and competitions to advance social and physical skills as well as drive overall mental wellbeing. These training sessions then lead into the No Limits division at the annual Fuel to Go & Play Association Championships, with teams competing in a one-day competition over the carnival weekend. 2024 saw 12 teams competing from various Associations throughout the state. In addition to this, various clinics and programs are held throughout the year to promote the program.

The Marie Little OAM Shield is a national competition for females aged 16 and over with an intellectual disability. Held in Queensland in 2024, the Western Swans played six matches in the beginning of September. After a challenging weekend, winning three out of six matches, the team equalled their best place in fourth position for the tournament. Although they didn't clinch that elusive bronze medal, the Western Swans once again displayed WA's talent on a national level.



MULTICULTURAL

Multicultural Carnival

The 2024 Multicultural Carnival saw the highest number of teams participate to date, with 150 teams attending from 42 different schools.

Teachers were impressed with the organisation of the day and the amount of enjoyment the students had competing against other schools, and the ability to allow students to be involved and play Netball who may not ordinarily play the sport at an Association level.

There was incredibly strong interest again in a boy's division, and subsequently we were able to provide two divisions of six teams in each, with age groups years seven-nine and years 10-12 competing.

Although primarily a participation carnival, a trophy is awarded to the team at the top of the ladder for each division at the end of the day.
